Applications will be dealt with on a first-come, first-served basis. If the ticket allocation is over-subscribed, persons who have volunteered for various projects in the village may take precedence.

Main conditions are:

- 1. All applicants must be **permanently resident** in Wangford or Henham and be registered on the Parish Council's electoral roll. A routine check will be made.
- 2. Households may apply for a maximum of four paid tickets per property, strictly for the use of registered members of that household (children 12 years and under are admitted with a child ticket, the Parish Clerk will advise as to how to obtain children's tickets).
- 3. The price of concessionary tickets is determined by the Latitude Festival organisers, Festival Republic Ltd. They allow no price variance.
- 4. Close of registration is Midnight, 7th April 2021. Cancellation of ticket requests may only be made before this time. Thereafter, the sale stands in law and must be concluded with the purchase of tickets requested.

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APRIL'S TEAM LETTER

Dare to hope

It's my misfortune to be a lifelong Tottenham Hotspur supporter. On a good day, the team are arguably among the finest exponents of 'the beautiful game'. But my experience is that we'll embark on a good run, and – just when we think we might achieve greatness – it all falls apart.

Watching the evolution of Covid has echoed that experience. At first, we thought it was just a little local difficulty. Then it became a pandemic. The first lockdown fostered, for some, a kind of Blitz spirit, until– just as we thought we were safe – the second wave hit. We had encouraging news of the vaccines, and then the variants snuck in when we weren't looking.

There have been so many twists and turns, so much speculation, so many false dawns, that it's difficult to invest in a life beyond Covid – it seems like some kind of *Shangri-La*. I don't know about you, but I've almost put hope on a shelf, thinking that I'll reach out for it when I can trust in it again.

As I write this (and who's to say how different life might seem by the time you read this), there is a road map – an exit strategy. Dare I begin to hope again? Of course, the Church – almost to the point of cliché – takes Christians through the sombre trials of Lent into the joy of Easter. There's a familiar arc from dark to light, from, sadness to joy. And that works because we know how the story ends. Back in the day, Jesus' friends didn't. After Jesus was executed on Friday, they had a long Saturday of grief and loss. There seemed nothing to hope for. But then, out of a blue sky, came resurrection. Life could begin again.

The writer of Psalm 30 wrote: "Weeping endures for a night, but joy comes with the morning." Maybe – even at their darkest moments – they dared to hope.

We can't know what life will be, or feel, like in July, or this time next year. It will be different. Hardship – though that's not its function – teaches us life-saving stuff, and can sometimes set us on another road. I really am trying not to be trite when I say that I'm constantly surprised by the ability of people to emerge wiser, kinder, stronger from the wreckage.

For me, the story of Easter says that we can start over. But it won't be like it was before. The world's changed. We're changed. We look ahead. Maybe – in this world – Spurs might win something...

Hope so.

Dog Fouling

The Parish Council would like to remind everyone to pick up their dog waste within the 30mph speed limit confines of the village. Failure to do so can result in prosecution and a fine of up to £1,000. The Council will not hesitate to prosecute if sufficient evidence is provided to any Councillor or the Clerk. If you see someone allowing their dog to foul and not picking up please inform us. Ideally we will need photographic evidence for prosecution.

Three additional dog bins have been installed at all the entrances to the playing field and allotments. Please use these and keep your dogs off the allotments. Whilst you are free to walk your dogs on the playing field, and this is proving very popular, please keep them on a lead at all times and keep them away from the allotment areas. The allotment holders pay an annual fee for their plot and are entitled to use them undisturbed. Fouling on the playing field and allotments will also result in prosecution.

Recycling at the Community Centre

The bottle, clothes and paper banks sited beside the Community Centre car park are provided for everyone's convenience, so it is disappointing that recently they have been misused.

Do not leave bottles on the ground in front of the bins. If you wish to be especially public spirited, you could always phone the recycling company on 01842 820804 to report that the banks need emptying!

Please note that the bottle banks are for glass jars and bottles ONLY. Other glass items should be put in your black bin or taken to an East Suffolk Council waste site.

Another recent problem has been fly-tipping beside the banks. Items dumped have included a picture frame, chopping boards, an electric kettle and a steam cleaner (see photo below). This is thoughtless and antisocial, disfiguring the site and meaning someone has to remove it and dispose of it correctly.

Cancellation of Strutt Your Mutt 2021



Sadly, Strutt Your Mutt Charity Dog Day and Walks due to be held on June 13th 2021 has had to be cancelled for the second year. Although this is disappointing, the priority is keeping visitors, volunteers, entertainers and traders safe. In such challenging and uncertain times and given the current government restrictions that will last at least until the 21st June, there is no alternative other than to cancel the event.

Easter Dangers for Dogs

Easter eggs and hot cross buns are tasty Easter indulgences for us, but they can be deadly to dogs so keep these seasonal treats to yourself.
