Jubilee 1950s-inspired Big Picnic Sunday 5th June

From lunchtime onwards on Sunday 5th there will be a Big Picnic and fun and games for all villagers at the Community Centre/Playing Field. Hopefully, the weather will be fine and sunny so bring a picnic blanket, chairs and your picnic supplies. There will be a licensed bar to purchase your favourite picnic accompaniment, and children will be offered a free soft drink. Tea and coffee will be available in the afternoon. Please do bring extra cakes or sandwiches to share or swap with friends and neighbours if you would like to do so.

For those not around in the 1950s, here are some suggestions for 1950s picnic items – ham, scotch eggs, sandwiches in grease-proof paper, cold sausages, pork pie and pickles, Victoria sandwich, tea loaf, scones, buns, biscuits. In 1952 some rationing was still in place, but during 1953 fresh eggs, cream and sweets (including chocolate) were freed from controls, and many of the street parties for the Coronation were veritable feasts after the privations of the war.

APRIL'S TEAM LETTER

Dear Friends

During Lent we have, in our groups, been following a course entitled "The Long Road to Heaven." The course has focussed on the film "The Way", that tells the story of Tom, who carries his son's ashes on the Camino, the pilgrim path to the shrine of St James at Compostela in Spain. The five weeks have addressed fine questions;

What are we saved from?

What are we saved for?

Who can be saved?

What do we have to do to be saved?

How are we saved?

As I write, we have not finished yet, so it will be exciting to see if we find good answers that move us and help us.

In 2000 there was a major exhibition called Seeing Salvation. Many people went to the National Gallery to see some of the world's greatest art works depicting the story of Jesus Christ. Borrowing this theme, Alan, Judy and I are going to choose some of our favourite pictures to serve as our point of focus during services in Holy Week.

The TV news is currently showing images of war in Ukraine, images of death, destruction and fear. There is no salvation in these pictures. The most recent study of climate change makes bleak reading and upsetting viewing, pictures of rainforests burning. I feel sick and deeply disturbed at such sights. Where is salvation in environmental destruction, and yet people need to eat, and land for crops.

To find the promise of salvation we need to discover hope, evidence of a fresh new start, of life restored, of darkness defeated, sins forgiven. John 20 verses 11 to 18 tell of the first Easter morning. The cross has done its worst, no body hangs now on its blood stained boards. The stone that sealed the finality of death in a stone cold tomb has been rolled back. Mary's tears of loss, her dark night, are answered by bright sunshine on a new fresh day. The words of the Gardener, the one who planted the Garden of Eden, now again bring the promise of all things made new. In him is our salvation.

Book Club

At our March meeting we discussed Sally Vickers' "The Librarian" which tells the story of a young librarian arriving at a rural town in 1959 to build up the children's library. She is more influential than she realises and not always in a good way. We thought the narrative outlined small town and rural life very well with the dynamics of class, expectation and opportunity. The larger first part of the book outlined the various characters and their relationships with each other and the second part of the book was a little unexpected. We thought we were hearing about the latter years of the librarian's life but it was one of the children she had helped who was considered to be a low achiever but became children's laureate. Sylvia the librarian disappeared into obscurity and was no more than a recollection and it was the effect she had on others that drove the narrative. We all agreed it was a light read and many of us remembered the references from the 1950s/60s. We did think the book was a little formulaic with portrayals of types of characters and some of the events were far-fetched and unbelievable. 1950s Recipe idea

Coconut Pyramids

6oz coconut
4oz caster sugar
1oz cornflour
½ teaspoon baking powder
½ teaspoon vanilla essence
2 egg whites (Food colouring if you wish!)

Beat egg whites until stiff. Mix in sugar, vanilla, coconut and the cornflour sieved with the baking powder.

Form mixture into pyramid shapes and place on greased and floured baking sheet or alternatively use rice paper.

Bake for 20-30 minutes at slightly under 375 degrees/170 degrees fan over or gas mark 5.

Next month we will have a Suffolk rusk recipe (there's quite a variety!)
