WANGFORD POST OFFICE

Thank you for your support in signing the petition and writing to Therese Coffey. We got 259 signatories in 7 days - well done. Unfortunately Post Office Ltd have refused to engage with us over the changes. They unilaterally decided to close the indoor facility on 21st March, to be replaced by a mobile van from 27th March. However, we have objected strongly to their intention to locate the van in the layby outside the church, and they have agreed to move it to the Community Centre car park. Our long-serving subpostmaster Danny Thorp has been made redundant.

As we feared, there is to be a reduction of 50% in our service. Unlike the other outreaches (one of which faces an 84% reduction, and another which has been closed altogether), we will still have 2 visits per week, but on consecutive days, and for only 1 hour each day. There has been no consultation about the choice of days, which means that on one Wednesday each month the van will be competing for carpark space with the mobile library!

The new times are: Wednesday 10.30 - 11.30 am Thursday 2.30 - 3.30 pm

APRIL'S TEAM LETTER

"Christ is Risen!" "He is Risen indeed!"

You will be reading this perhaps a couple of days before or after Easter. Easter is very early this year. I remember one Easter struggling up steep hills in North Essex, (they are not known as the Essex Highlands for nothing!), in the snow trying to get to the next village to take the Easter Service. On arrival, the church bells were being rung heartily and near the entrance to the church was a large wooden cross adorned with dozens of glowing yellow daffodils. It was a wonderful symbol of resurrection life in the deep snow. In that tiny village church over a hundred people were ready to praise and worship Christ our Risen Redeemer. Such joy!

I read somewhere very recently, though I cannot find where now, that in the Soviet days in Russia, on Easter day there was a packed hall of people listening to an ardently atheistic speaker outlining why belief in God was unnecessary. He went on and on and on. After his speech a priest got up and said one sentence to the people gathered there: "Christ is Risen" and back came a resounding "He is Risen indeed!" The people knew from their own lived experience that Jesus Christ has broken all constraints of time and space by being present with us everywhere, anywhere and at all times.

The Easter season, like Christmas, does not last just for one glorious day of consuming Easter eggs, the donning of Easter bonnets (do people still do this anywhere?) and rolling decorated hard boiled eggs down any convenient slope. It lasts until Pentecost : 50 days later. In fact you could argue that every Sunday is a mini Easter when we come together to worship our Risen Lord and to share his Risen body and blood in the Eucharist. Then being sent out, we the Church, are to continue his work of love and forgiveness, caring for others and standing up against injustice.

Book Club

At our March meeting we discussed 'Agent Sonya' by Ben Macintyre. It was generally agreed that this was an incredibly interesting narrative based on the life of a communist spy who operated in plain sight in the UK and the inability of MI5 and MI6 to connect the signs and facts of her rather unusual behaviour. Ursula's story began as a young Jewish woman from a well-off family in Germany in the years, leading up to World War II. She felt strongly about the many injustices she saw and became politically active. Almost by chance when accompanying her husband to a job in Shanghai, she was recruited into Russia's communist party. She eventually became known as Agent Sonya, and achieved the highest rank in active communism held by a woman at that time.

We saw that luck also played a part and that she was never betrayed although many of her colleagues were. Her cover was of a housewife and mother and she took her children with her to the various places she worked and covered miles of the Oxfordshire countryside on her bike. She was adept at assembling radio equipment, gathering intelligence and inspiring others to help her.

Ursula lived an incredible life and in her later years became a successful author. We discussed whether everything in this superbly written and compulsive narrative was factual and we felt there must be some authorial input in connecting events and her thoughts. Ursula gave everything to a cause which she felt could save the world but as alliances were made and broken both politically and socially, we came to see that the ideals of fairness, truth and coexistence were ultimately unachievable.

The majority of us agreed this book is highly recommended and compulsive reading.

We next meet on Thursday 4th April at 8pm in the Community Centre to discuss Kate Atkinson's 'Shrines of Gaiety'.

The Birds, the Bees and the Flowers

In our village, we have various projects ongoing to help enhance life in Wangford for wildlife and people who benefit from living here. This month we are celebrating a special bird who will soon return to our skies, the Swift, as well giving an update on the progress of our Community Garden area.

Our volunteers continue their excellent work keeping the Community Garden and WildSpace looking beautiful. There is already plenty of colour with bulbs, wild flowers and shrubs flowering. The array of daffodils, donated by the Council, will soon be making a dazzling display behind the village sign and beyond. The flowers are already attracting bees and ladybirds, and we look forward to seeing more birds as the trees grow and mature providing more insect homes.



Soon we will be looking out for the return of Summer birds; Swallows and most importantly Swifts. We are very lucky to have these high speed acrobats of the sky nesting in our village. Their numbers have gone down so we want to do all we can to protect them and the old roofs where they nest. There are

already special nest boxes above the village shop (you may hear recorded calls being played to attract them). We are preparing a banner to hang out to welcome them, donated by SOS Swifts (Save our Suffolk Swifts Action group; more information online). If you plan any roof works to pre-war buildings, please keep the months of May-August undisturbed as these are Red-list birds, protected by law.

Letters to the Editor

Abraham wrote about Harold Becker and family, whose widow and daughter moved to Wangford after Harold died. As an old Wangfordian I can report that during my childhood I was aware of two ladies by the name of Becker living in Little Priory, Church Street, Wangford. At that age I never knew their relationship but do remember one was called Janet.

I know of no other Old Vicarage in Wangford – only that which is now divided into numbers 1, 2 & 3 as stated. What I do know is, people who live outside Wangford often confuse Wangford with Wenhaston, Wrentham or Westleton. I have experienced this many times and to me it is perfectly possible that Abraham's 'sources' may have also confused the Vicarages.

The late Douglas Howeld provided information in a booklet compiled for 'Wangford Week' in 2004 that 'Little Priory' was originally named 'Church House', but the only connection with the Church as far as he knew was the possibility of old Priory remains in the orchard. Prior to the Beckers moving in it was the home of Samuel Clutten, Registrar of Births and Deaths, Southwold District. I think the Luxtons bought the property direct from the Beckers. Interestingly Douglas also advised that the paddock was at one time the local branch of the British Legion's bowls green.

My father's generation spoke of Janet Becker with celebrity status - she was described as an artist and author.

The late Joan Hunting's memoirs, also compiled in 2004, expand on this. Janet Becker used to invite the children into her garden for art classes. During WW2 she was a WVS volunteer and would visit the searchlight battery with her trolley full of goodies for them. She produced small greeting cards which she sold through Clarkes the baker, and wrote (or edited) The Story of Southwold by F. Jenkins, a small book about Blythburgh, a booklet on Sutherland House, and a novel entitled 'Ploughshare into Pylon'. Paul Scriven believes Janet pre-deceased her mother. There is a memorial to her on the north wall of Blythburgh Church.

Harry Becker is remembered in Wenhaston by a development named 'Beckers View'.

Apropos last month's scribbles, the sainted one (and Mrs Abe) informed me that I had written about Harry Becker before, in 2021. Dear me, is the old boy losing it?

What is a true reunion and does it serve any useful purpose? The idea I suppose is to make the effort to turn up and hope that by meeting old, almost-long-forgotten friends, some semblance of pleasant catching up and reviving happy memories might be shared. I read that half a dozen students applauded in a cinema in a German city when watching a documentary about the organisation of the holocaust. Witnesses said that the applause occurred at the end of the film when the words "Six million Jews were murdered under the rule of the National Socialists" appeared on screen. This sort of behaviour renders one speechless.

Still in Germany, apparently a linguistic study has found that English has at least 546 'drunkonyms' i.e. words meaning stocious, bladdered, wellied etc. Surely a candidate for the Guinness Book of Records? Don't forget that you'll need photo ID to vote on 2nd May. Acceptable documents (even if they're out of date so long as the photo is still a good likeness) are

- Passport Driving licence
- Blue badge
- PASS card

If you haven't got photo ID, you can apply for a free Voter Authority Certificate, but the deadline for this is 5.00pm on Wednesday 24th April.
