AUGUST'S TEAM LETTER

Dear Friends,

Like many people I spent much of July with a growing sense of excitement that football was coming home. The unexpected progress of the England team through the competition fuelled a belief that finally, after 52 years, we might actually win. Just 20 minutes of the semi final remained when a Croatian equaliser shattered our dreams.

The sense of exile being replaced with hope, expectation and homecoming reminded me of the people of Israel, who in Old Testament times were in exile in Babylon. Far from home, living as slaves in a foreign land, they wondered why God had abandoned them and they prayed that they might go home. In the fullness of time their prayers were answered.

In the time of Jesus the people of Israel felt that they lived in a time of spiritual exile. Even though they lived in their own land, it was ruled by a foreign Roman army. God seemed to have forgotten them again. The longing for a Messiah was a longing in the heart that God might come home and renew his home among his people.

For Christians Jesus is the answer to that prayer. Jesus is God in the midst of us, God who has come home.

Much of the New Testament was written after the Romans destroyed Jerusalem and demolished the Temple. Just after the time of Christ a war broke about between the Jewish people and their Roman conquerors as the Jews tried to free themselves from Roman rule. The Romans destroyed Jerusalem in AD70 and the survivors of the war were driven into exile around the Mediterranean world. The writings of the New Testament anticipate this tragedy and reflect upon it.

The scattered community is encouraged to believe that while they are not at home in Jerusalem, the risen Christ is with them by his Holy Spirit. Wherever his faithful people are he is at home with them, and lives among them.

We live in interesting times, with former certainties being challenged. Brexit, President Trump and climate change suggest that life in the future might be based on different parameters and assumptions to all that we are used to. In my job I see how the different stages of life from birth to death, and all points in between, affect our sense of self and place and home. We try to cling to the ideas and the things that we think will make us feel at home. However we cannot stop the progress of time or the process of change.

St Augustine understood "our hearts are restless until they find their rest (home) in thee." Only in Christ Jesus will we find the permanent sense of home and belonging for which our hearts yearn.

Football might have extended its absence by enjoying a vacation in France. Christ Jesus never left and lives with us still, meeting the deepest longings of our hearts when we invite him to make his home with us.

Dogs - ice cubes and frozen treats

We are aware of several views on this subject on social media. In our opinion ice cubes are OK to give dogs, but not really necessary. Cool drinking water and paddling pools etc are sufficient.

However, in the case of a dog suffering from a heatstroke crisis, then we do have to be careful that we do not induce shock, so would use wet towels and NOT ice cubes.

If you suspect heatstroke, wet your dog down with room temperature water – focusing on your pet's underside and then go straight to your vet.


