Wangford Community Centre Reopening

Wangford Community Council has agreed a cautious approach to reopening the Centre based on advice from Chief Medical Officer Chris Whitty, who said the key was to take things incredibly slowly, adding that he fully expected most people to continue to take precautions. Initial discussions with users indicate that they agree with this approach.

The Centre is now open, and all regular hirers will by now have received a copy of the Centre's Risk Assessment, a re-booking questionnaire, and supplementary conditions of hire to comply with the risk assessment.

Rest assured that when you decide to return, everything will be done to facilitate this in a safe way. The Centre has a COVID-safe cleaning regime in place, and you will be asked to play your part, for example by sanitising your equipment and frequently-touched surfaces, and by ensuring adequate ventilation.

AUGUST'S TEAM LETTER

Dear Friends,

We still live in uncertain times as we emerge from Covid. Hopefully August will be a month in which we take further confident steps back towards normality. I am grateful to those church members and volunteers who have been able to press ahead with the South Cove Flower Festival and Uggeshall Teas, both of which will just have happened but which I am sure went well.

In September we can look forward to Harvest Festivals and singing in church, and all the things that we have missed. (I am writing this on 1st July so if things look different in September than are currently being promised you will forgive me).

In Mark's Gospel Chapter 6 verses 1 - 6 we read the story of how Jesus returns home to Nazareth after a time of ministry in and around Capernaum. While by the lake the people throughd to Jesus and he was able to preach the good news of the kingdom of God, heal the sick, bless and include the Gentiles, and great things were happening.

Back in Nazareth it all goes flat. The people there feel they know Jesus, they know his family, they are not going to accept the ministry of a lad who grew up just down the street. The people in his own community took offence at Jesus, and he was not able to minister among them. "Familiarity breeds contempt" is a saying that we are familiar with.

As we emerge from lockdown I think we face a challenge together. During lockdown we have been in a sense away from home, away from normality, and maybe we can give thanks for the ways in which Jesus has ministered to us in troubling times. As lockdown ends and we return home to normality we might ask who Jesus is for us now and in the future? We can fall out of the habit of going to church. We might still be anxious about protecting our health, we might feel that it is all too familiar and something we know all about. That would be the Nazareth option. With this choice Jesus was amazed at their unbelief and moved on. Or we might joyfully return to church, look forward to seeing one another again, to sharing fellowship and reaffirming friendships. We might long to pray, sing and worship together. That would be the Capernaum option. In Capernaum Jesus made his home and exercised his ministry.

We look forward to seeing our whole church family back in our churches worshipping together in spirit and in truth, and as we choose the way of life he will do great things among us.

As a youngster she attended Reydon Modern School, and also the Frostenden Youth Club, where she caught the eye of the young, long-haired Rodney Moore, who asked her out on several occasions. After a few rejections due to her friends' not-so-shining reviews of Rodney, she agreed to a date just to shut him up! Despite her mother's initial reservations, having commented "what the heck have you brought home" on Rod's first visit, he soon became part of the family, and the rest was history. The following year, Sarah their only child was born, and they moved to Millfields, Wangford, where they lived happily together for over 45 years.

Gerry worked for Henham estates as a farm hand in years gone by, but was probably best recognised as the face of 'Dennis's Fish and Chips' where she worked for many, many years, and indeed had many a laugh with Darrel, Dennis, Barry and Rose.

Family was the most important thing to Gerry, especially her grandchildren Kieron and Shannon whom she doted on, and was incredibly proud of. She loved having all the family over for get-togethers, and family dinners around the table wouldn't be complete without one of Gerry's completely innocent innuendos which would always leave the whole table giggling and Gerry wondering what was so funny. She had a knack and indeed a reputation for using the wrong words at the right time for full comedic value.

Christmas was one of Gerry's favourite times of the year. Her Christmas tree was always perfectly decorated, often taking her hours, and in years gone by Christmas Day would be an open house.

Her second love was all things horses. From her first pony at the age of 11, horses became an everyday way of life for the next 30-odd years. Gerry wasn't too keen on the riding part, she just loved caring for them, and was chief groom for Sarah whilst they were out competing, which she often commented were some of the happiest years of her life. 'Mr Wonderful', Gerry's horse of a lifetime, was indeed the love of her life. Rod often joked that knew his place in this particular love triangle.

Holidays were another big part of Gerry and Rod's life together. She adored her holidays abroad, none more than ones with family and friends, and more recently some wonderful holidays in the UK with Linda, and Edna and Richard.

Gerry loved life, and loved a good time. She was a kind and wonderful person who was always thinking of everyone around her. She loved her animals; she loved her home and her garden (especially her collection of Japanese acers); and she loved Andy Murray. She fought her battle with cancer bravely, and with great dignity.
