
The Community Council itself raised £170.00 for funds, which brought the total from this year's three sales to £559.80.

DECEMBER'S TEAM LETTER

Dear Friends,

I was watching the start of the Rugby world cup a few days ago. One of the commentators said that it would be a real boost for our country to win because we have had such a difficult year. And then we lost.

2019 does feel to have been a difficult year. Paralysis over Brexit, growing awareness and concern about climate change, woes on the nation's high streets and continued violence in Syria are all features that have troubled us. But we did win the cricket world cup!

As 2019 draws to a close we will be hoping and praying that the General Election opens the door to a brighter 2020, but only if there is a fundamental change in the way we treat each other, and if we learn to disagree well.

A troubled outlook for the nation and a hope for a brighter future were features that loomed large in the public consciousness when Jesus was born in Bethlehem 2000+ years ago. The people of Israel felt lost in their own land because of the Roman occupation. The poor struggled with low incomes and punitive taxes. There was religious tension between peoples of different faiths and a fear that God was absent.

Into this very human melting pot of hopes and fears the Christ child was born. He did not come as a new powerful force either in politics or in military terms. He did not make promises that could not be kept. He did not come in a big display of self importance. Instead Jesus was born unnoticed, in poverty, as a vulnerable baby. Embraced first by his mother, then by Joseph, then by his disciples and friends, the love of God began to bring new hope, new life, one heart at a time.

In our generation that invitation is renewed. St Paul describes love in 1 Corinthians Chapter 13. Love is patient, kind, truthful, hopeful. Love is not envious, boastful, arrogant, rude, irritable or resentful. Winning the world cup would not have changed us much in the long term. Love might, because it has the power to inspire us. As we celebrate his birth may the love of Christ bless you this Christmas. May we walk to gether in the light of his love and share together in a bright new year.





Book Club

At our November meeting we discussed Anne Tyler's' Vinegar Girl' which was a re-working of Shakespeare's 'The Taming Of The Shrew'. Some members had seen the musical 'Kiss me Kate' which also used Shakespeare's work. Many of us had read Anne Tyler's novels and felt this was rather light in content and message. We wondered if it was credible in a modern age.

The story was centred around Kate, in her late 20s, who kept house for her father and much younger sister. The professor father wanted Kate to marry his Polish assistant to keep him in the USA so their work could be finished. There were many humorous moments but lacked punch and sometimes was in danger of turning into slapstick comedy. This was a modern take on arranged marriages but it was very light in tone. Kate and Pyotr did marry and the epilogue was placed several years in the future and looked back on a happy ever after life of success for all. We found Kate difficult to relate to and the lack of social awareness at odds with the modern setting but we did agree it was a light and enjoyable book.

ABRAHAM

I heard a little radio programme recently, narrated by a school sixth former, which dealt with Akenfield then and now. Akenfield was an amalgamation of Suffolk villages, but primarily Charsfield, set in the early 20th Century, and dealt with rural life. Generally considered to be a minor masterpiece, it was made into a film by a good old Suffolk boy, Sir Peter Hall, at weekends and with local folk playing the parts, including the author himself, Ronald Blythe, as the vicar. Mr Blythe, now 96 years old, featured in the radio programme, as did the voices of the departed Peggy Cole and Peter Hall. After discussing the immense changes since that time, Mr Blythe and a local opined wistfully that some things were doubtless lost and gone, never to return. I expect they were referring to the community spirit engendered by the closeness of the villagers and the necessity to cleave together in times of immense hardship and grinding poverty. Life seemed to be simpler and more innocent then, before the perceived iniquities of the latter part of the century intruded. Would they wish these times to return? Of course not. What they wish is that the best of yesteryear be mingled with the best of today, which, as we all know, is not easy. I did not live through particularly harsh days, but in the late forties and early fifties I did witness in my village remnants of the so-called 'good old days', such as appalling housing conditions, food rationing, the tied cottage system (a school chum and his family were given one week to vacate their house when their farm labourer father suddenly died), dirt floors, lack of sanitation (bucket and chuck it), minimal heating, low wages, scarce holidays - need I go on? But do read Akenfield. A historian remarked that if you want to learn about rural life then, forget the history books, just read Akenfield.

I have given a little thought to a suitable collective noun for 'Marks'. Two of my chums suggested a 'murmur' (boring) or a 'magnificence' (pompous). I had a brainwave. What do good old boys do when they stand at the bar with their pints handy? They spout drivel. Not for us the state of the nation, climate change, rainforests and all ecological points north. We leave all that to the intellectuals of Wangford. No, for us it's non-stop tripe. Bearing that in mind, I thought perhaps a 'mumbling' or a 'muttering'. Then I pondered again. We are, after all, in dear old Suffolk, so what else could it be but that grand old word 'mardle'? Cracked it.

We now have a female Club Captain at Southwold Golf Club. And they are, as we speak, creating a women's changing room in the 'holy of holies', the Royal and Ancient clubhouse at St Andrews. And there are now female Morris dancers. Whatever next? Voting? Driving cars? A female Prime Minister? Being served in public bars? I tell you, lads, we're doomed!

My grand old oppo C asks if I would like to go and hear Neil Oliver (he of the tossing hair and cricked neck banging on about ancient times). I reckoned I could listen to him for about an hour. After all, how long does it take to rabbit on about the British Isles? So - off to Norwich. A nice bit of grub in a pub - four fine main meals, a bottle of wine and another drink for £40, and no, it wasn't a Wetherspoons. When we reached the venue and discovered that it was scheduled to start at 7.30 and finish at 10.30, C, bless his little heart, did say that if I got bores we could leave early. Not I, bracing myself for two and a half hours of 'The Story of the British Isles in 100 Places'. Once again, it proved what a fool I can be. He was terrific. Never a dull moment. I was enthralled. He managed to cover all four countries in splendid fashion. Orkney, inevitably, I suppose, got three mentions. Nearer to home, Orford featured, as did Aldeburgh - not for Benjamim Britten, but for the fact that Sir Fancis Drake's original Golden Hind was built in the shipyards there. He concluded by reminding us that, of all the countries he has explored, despite our woes, problems and issues, there is no better place to live than the UK. Amen to that. (I have to get this in. When he signed the book I happened to mention that my little girl was Custodian of St Magnus Cathedral, and he informed me that that was one of his most favourite places, and next time he is in the archipelago, he will seek her out).

In our postbox there was, below the newspaper, a cute little pottery pussy cat. The phantom moggie donor has returned. This may well be a one-off, but watch this space.

It has occurred to me that this issue of the Messenger will come out at the end of this month, and the next at the end of December. Therefore, to my half dozen or so loyal band of readers, an early very merry Christmas
