TRAFFIC CHAOS

Councillors in Reydon and Wangford are urging residents to make representations to Suffolk Highways, County Councillors, and MP Therese Coffey (therese.coffey.mp@parliament.uk) about the ongoing heavy traffic in the villages caused by the closure of the B1127 due to damage caused by extensive tidal flooding at Potters Bridge. Repairs must be complete to both the drainage valves and the road before the closure can be removed, but neither Suffolk County Council nor the Environment Agency have given a timescale for this.



The diversion route via the B1126 is having a significant impact, especially at Wangford, where the bottleneck at Norfolk Road sees queues of traffic at peak periods and a great deal of bad driving and impatience; there have already been two accidents at the dangerous A12 junction.

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DECEMBER'S TEAM LETTER

The people that walked in darkness have seen a great light: they that dwell in the land of the shadow of death, upon them hath the light shined. Isaiah Chapter 9

This well known verse from the 9th chapter of the prophet Isaiah came to my mind while watching the efforts of world leaders to reach consensus at the recent COP26 summit in Glasgow. Many Christians globally supported that conference in prayer, interceding with God that his Holy Spirit would guide decision makers into the ways of justice and responsibility. By the end of the conference there were signs of hope, new light shining in the darkness. There were promises to reduce the use of coal, to cut carbon emissions, and to halt deforestation.

Last year Christmas was impacted by Coronavirus, a darkness that has still not gone away, so we are all hoping for light to shine and for the darkness to be lifted. Anxiety about these things is very real for many people because the threat of climate change renders the future uncertain, and coronavirus remains a blight on people's health, education and businesses. "What will tomorrow bring?" is a common cry on all our hearts, not just in respect of global matters, but also personal and family matters. The angel Gabriel comforts Mary with the reassurance not to be afraid. "How can this be?" she protests.

Some things do indeed seem too difficult, too challenging, to cope with or overcome. We need to hear the strength of the angel's confidence in the God who has sent him; "The Holy Spirit will come upon you", "for nothing is impossible with God."

This does not mean that the future will be easy for Mary. The prophet Simeon forewarns her of the sword that will pierce her heart, the grief of standing at the foot of the cross on Good Friday. The angel tells Mary that her child will be holy, the son of God, and this she finally understands to be true on that first Easter morning when the light of the risen Christ shatters the darkness forever, and makes all things new.

We walk with Mary on the same journey of faith and love and joy. She trusted in God, even in the most unlikely, unpromising and hardest of circumstances. She followed her Son Jesus Christ in discipleship. Her journey gave her reasons to laugh with joy and to cry with sorrow, to befriend, serve and welcome others. Sometimes the going seemed easy, at other times very hard. She believed and trusted in God and ultimately her confidence was not misplaced. At the promise of her baby Mary sang the Magnificat, Luke Chapter 1 verses 46 to 55. It is a song of hope, liberation and joy. It is a good song to read while praying for the future of our global family and for the right actions by governments. It is a song by a single young woman ready to play her part in God's redeeming works. It is a song to make our own, as we like Mary prepare to welcome the Christ child and commit ourselves to walk in his ways as children of light.

May you know the joy of welcoming the light of Christ this Christmas, and of walking with him into a new year.

Update on Wangford Community Garden

The Parish Council would like to thank all of the volunteers for their hard work over the past year on this wonderful project. Despite the difficulties and restrictions of recent times people of Wangford have done an incredible job of transforming a barren piece of grass into a garden for all. Wild species have increased and the wide selection of planting has improved the site.

Recently we have planted almost 3000 bulbs and sown a special seed mix of British grown native wildflower species suited to our dry, poor nutrient soil. We are hoping for a colourful spring and summer brightened up by the Crocus, Daffodil, Allium and Tulip bulbs. The bees and other insects should love it. If you know anyone that can help record the wildlife species please let us know.

Book Club

At our November meeting we discussed 'Black Berry and Wild Rose' by Sonia Welton. Most of us agreed that it was an easy read and well written, but there was quite a division as to whether or not it classified as a "good book". Several people enjoyed the narrative style where the two main characters (Esther and Sara) spoke from their own points of view, but others felt the characterisation lacked depth. We did all agree that the descriptions of silk weaving at Spitalfields in the 18th century were excellent, but although we were told a little about the Huguenot community in London, many felt this could have been extended so that we came to understand more fully their lifestyle and beliefs. One thing that did become apparent was that outsiders were unwelcome, as was anyone who did not adhere to the strict code of behaviour.

Esther was a Huguenot wife and her husband ran a silk business. Esther was desperate to design and weave her silk but being female she was not able to do this. Her desire to succeed led to momentous events. Sara was the complete opposite. When she arrived in London knowing very little she was taken in by Mrs Swann where she worked in a brothel until she could escape. Both women were prisoners of their time with little ability to decide their own futures and although this should have bought them ideologically closer, the decisions they made pushed them further away from each other.

Some readers felt the story lacked gravitas and the subject matter deserved so much more. We thought the power of the silk owners was apparent and the descriptions of the 'mob mentality' were well drawn. We did think the ending was a little too neat and there could have been so much more on the history of silk weaving, the struggle of journeymen, the start of 'combination' as a forerunner to unions and a greater depth to the life of the Huguenot community.

We next meet on Thursday 2nd December in the Community Centre at 8 pm to discuss Stef Penney's 'Under a Pole Star'.
