



#### **DECEMBER'S TEAM LETTER**

Dear Friends,

I have recently watched a new film on Netflix, a remake of the film "All Quiet on the Western Front", based on the novel by Erich Maria Remarque. This has put me in mind of World War One, the Christmas Truce and our current worldly circumstances.

At Christmas in 1918 the Rev'd Claude Hope-Sutton wrote in the Parish Magazine the following words. He wrote as the war was seemingly dragging on into a fifth year, with no obvious end in sight:

My dear Parishioners,

I find it very difficult to know what to say to you in my letter this month. It is usual to wish you all a Happy Christmas and New Year, but just now the outlook for the next year is anything but happy, and the prospects seem to point to much more suffering and hardship before the victory can be won.

There is much in what he writes that might have echoes with our situation today. The war in Ukraine, the cost of living crisis, and a growing sense of urgency about climate change have all combined to make life feel harder and less certain. Many families around the country are planning simpler Christmas holidays on tighter budgets than usual.

Back in 1918 Rev'd Hope Sutton encouraged his readers thus;

If we can go forward in prayer, trusting to God as our leader and seeking earnestly as a nation to keep his commandments, we may be assured that we shall be able to bless Him at the end of the year for the way He has led us.

We know that by the end of 1918 there had indeed been much more fighting, suffering and loss, but in November the war ended and 1919 began with the exciting prospect of building a lasting peace and a better world.

Echoing Claude Hope Sutton's sentiments we remember that at Christmas Christ was born into the full reality of the human condition, born that God might be with us, that we are not alone, and that the love of God leads us from darkness to light. What Claude Hope Sutton longed for was a renewed society in which people prayed for each other, cared about each other and worked together for a fairer peaceful world. He knew that by turning to God this vision was possible. I think that is still true today.

If you are in The Angel, please feel free to bring your beer and come along with a lantern or torch to join in our festivities to mark the beginning of Christmas. Other refreshments including non-alcoholic drinks, mulled wine and some snacks will be available and any donations for charity will be very welcome. Please note if the weather is inclement 'Beer and Carols' will go ahead but it will be inside the church.

Some of our Christmas services will be joint with St Margaret, Reydon. On Saturday 24 December (Christmas Eve) at 4pm at St Margaret, Reydon there will be an all-age Crib and Christingle Service with a topical World Cup theme. Do come along with all the family. At 11.00pm at St Margaret, Reydon there will be a Midnight Communion Service. #### Book Club

At our November meeting we discussed 'Fatal Inheritance' by Rachel Rhys. It was quite timely to read this book after last month's similar theme. Most people agreed that it was well written with good characterisation and imagery, if at times on the point of unbelievability, although some did find the narrative dreary and dull. The story was set in the post-war 1940s and we felt the language and description matched the time period well whereas the previous month's book did not. There were a lot of characters and events which required attention. We followed the main character Eve Forrester in her dull marriage in which she had no power even over herself, through the letter announcing she had an inheritance on the Riviera, and her journey to France. Eve came to see her own strengths and forged her own way of life which suited her. There were episodes of thwarted danger linked to confiscated valuable artworks in the Second World War. There was much questioning as to why Guy Lester included Eve in his Will and jealousy from his wife and children who questioned what right she had to be included. It transpired that it was Guy who had killed her father accidentally.

There was a predictable ending in that the unkind mother who Eve thought was hers was not and she discovered that her own mother was in an asylum following the emotional trauma of having seen her husband killed. Eve did not return to the UK but bought a home on the Riviera with her inheritance and her birth mother came to live with her. Lots of narrative loose ends were tied up in this readable book.

We next meet on Thursday 1st December at 8pm in the Community Centre to discuss Barbara Erskine's 'Sleeper's Castle'.

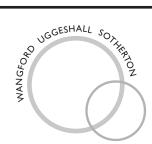

#### **ABRAHAM**

On we go. Slowly. This is definitely going to take more than a year. *George Mackay Brown* - Not a name familiar to many English folk. Nor, I suspect to many Scots. The Bard of Orkney, born in the second, smaller, of the only two towns on the Islands, Stromness, a beautiful, ancient burgh, from where, apart from three short sojourns, he never left. A terrific poet, he lived with his mum and dad, and after their death, on his own. In later years he found friendship and artistic collaboration with Peter Maxwell Davies, one-time Master of the Queen's Music. I have rested oftimes on George's memorial bench, overlooking Scapa Flow to Hoy. Try and obtain a copy of George's writings if you can. Worthy reading.

John Brown - Queen Victoria's Highland Servant. A fine biography about this controversial relationship. Why was the Queen besotted with him? Saving her from an assassination attempt may have helped. When she died, she was buried holding a photograph of this most loyal servant in her hand.

Beyond The 39 Steps - A Life of John Buchan by Ursula Buchan one of John Buchan's grandchildren, who writes fine books about gardening. Noted mostly for The 39 Steps, he was much more than that. A scholar, antiquarian, barrister, colonial administrator, journal editor, literary critic, publisher, war correspondent, director of wartime propaganda, member of parliament and Governor-General of Canada. How much can one man cram in? Given a state funeral.

Robert Burns - what more to say about this giant?
Before I leave the 'Bs' I mention that, on the 6th November, one of the true greats, Ronald Blythe was 100 years old.

The "Moon Under Water" is a 1946 essay by George Orwell, his last contribution to the Evening Standard, in which he regales us with a description of his ideal public house, the fictitious "Moon Under Water". He stipulated ten important points that would make the pub ideal for him. He confessed that he knew a few that almost attained his high standards, including one that had eight of his favoured criteria, which may have been the Compton Arms in Islington, North London, but more of that later. The criteria are now considered quaint, one being -'Upstairs, six days a week, you can get a good solid lunch - for example, a cut off the joint, two vegetables and a boiled jam roll - for about three shillings'. The one to which I relate and that is still relevant today is 'The pub is quiet enough to talk with the house possessing neither a radio nor a piano'. Substitute television, muzak, juke box, gambling machines, etc and you have it. A note of caution, however. Being hard of hearing I find the acoustics in some pubs contribute to an uncomfortable noise level. Neither do loudmouthed, leery customers help. On that point the aforementioned Compton Arms has been assailed with a complaint about noise pollution, indicating that the sound of people conversing, laughing, telling jokes, enjoying each other's company offends a person's sensibilities. What next? Chimeless church bells, crowless cockerels, odourless pig farms? In the face of rocketing rents and rates, cheap booze from the supermarkets, rising food costs, staffing problems, closures and immense losses due to the pandemic, do pubs need more grief from whingeing neighbours? Pubs are an asset to any community, particularly rural ones. Let them be.

Several Wetherspoons' pubs have used The Moon Under Water as their name. The chain has been in the news recently for having to close 32 of its pubs, due to pandemic caution, rising wages, cost of repairs and 'drink at home' culture acquired during lockdown. For all you 'Spoons' enthusiasts, do not despair. There are still over 800 outlets offering cheap booze and good wholesome food. Despite all the snobbish criticism they will survive and be back to full strength soon for the simple reason that Wetherspoons are too good at what they do. Last orders are a long way off.

Listen, all you wassaillers, the Rev. Alan invites you to meet him outside the Village Shop just before 6.00 p.m. on 21st December to join the usual village carolling party, wandering round the village for an hour belting out carols to your heart's content. You will then continue the warbling in the Churchyard from 7.00 p.m. to 8.00 p.m. accompanied by, if you like, beer from the pub and mulled wine from the church. Do make this a jolly festive occasion.

#### Wangford Mens' Breakfast

Mr. David Moss the owner of the Angel Inn entertained a dozen attendees on the 19th November. He gave a resume of how his business has grown from a wine bar to a small chain of local pubs, the difficulties of lockdown and a bright view of future trading. A cold morning saw a welcome 'Bloody Mary' kick off the meeting, all followed by an excellent breakfast.


