

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
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FEBRUARY'S TEAM LETTER

On Sunday 31 December, those of us at the Team service in Reydon, or the 8.00am service in Southwold, would have heard Russ, our new Rector, talking about what we can do as a church to engage with our community. Russ's first point was that we can be welcoming to everyone. This reminded me of something that Stephen Cottrell told us when he was Bishop of Chelmsford (he is now of course the Archbishop of York). He said this:

"I want to turn the church inside out. What I mean by that is, we have got so many good things inside the church - which are exactly the things people are looking for- but they don't know how to access them. So rather than waiting for people to come to the church, we the church have got to be out there with the people.I want every church to be a kind of heartbeat for its community offering people the things that they long for - peace, space, affirmation, meaning. Quite simply, the church should be a place where we offer a welcome to absolutely everyone. I can't think of anywhere else where that happens. You don't need to fill in a form, you don't need to pay a subscription. You are welcome unequivocally."

So, then I also remembered another piece about unequivocal welcome which is seen by visitors when they arrive at Coventry Cathedral:

We extend a special welcome to those who are single, married, divorced, widowed, straight, gay, confused, well-heeled or down-at-heel. We especially welcome wailing babies and excited toddlers. We welcome you whether you can sing like Pavarotti or just growl quietly to yourself. You're welcome here if you're just browsing, just woken up or just got out of prison. We don't care if you're more Christian than the Archbishop of Canterbury or haven't been to church since Christmas 10 years ago. We extend a special welcome to those who are over 60 but not grown up yet and to teenagers who are growing up too fast.

We welcome keep-fit mums, football dads, starving artists, tree huggers, latte sippers, vegetarians, junk food eaters. We welcome those who are in recovery or still addicted. We welcome you if you're having problems, are down in the dumps or don't like organized religion. We're not that keen on it either. We offer welcome to those who think the earth is flat, work too hard, don't work, can't spell, or are here because Granny is visiting and wanted to come to the cathedral. We welcome those who are inked, pierced, both or neither.

We offer a special welcome to those who could use a prayer right now, had religion shoved down their throats as kids or got lost on the ring road and wound up here by mistake. We welcome pilgrims, tourists, seekers, doubters and you.

From 10th June this year it will be mandatory for all pet cats over the age of 20 weeks to be microchipped. This is an important step in ensuring the safety of our feline friends.

Microchips are about the size of a large grain of rice, and are easily implanted with a quick injection into the scruff of the neck and then scanned to ensure they can be read. This simple and relatively painless procedure can give you peace of mind and increase the chances of a safe return if your cat ever gets lost by tracing you through the national Pet Log database.

We combined our January meeting with an informal evening and post-Christmas games. We discussed Sally Rooney's "Beautiful World, Where Are You". This book met with a very mixed reception. Some of us liked her cleverly crafted narrative, but others found the depiction of relationships and the lack of characterisation difficult to overcome. Relationships appeared transient, swapped and dysfunctional, played out on a stage of old friendships, new friends and Tinder. The emails between Alice and Eileen appeared to take the place of a soliloguy and set out what they were thinking and feeling. Several people commented that they found the subject (which we assumed to be finding the elusive beautiful world), characters and situations a little boring, formulaic and covering just about every example of human relationship and response. In many ways we felt the book reflected modern life where everything can be available, the influence of social media, and the effect this has on relationships There was a rather predictable ending with Eileen and Simon expecting a baby. We thought this may be the promise of the 'beautiful world' which Eileen was searching for. Three cheers for the villagers of Twyford, near Winchester who complained about the omission of the possessive apostrophe from a new street sign. Apparently, Winchester Council have adopted a "no apostrophe" for all new signs. Following guidance from the Ordnance Survey and Local Government Association, the Council Leader was advised that new street names did not include punctuation. The reasons given for removing punctuation are because it can be misinterpreted by computer systems and it is faster for emergency services to search their database without using punctuation. So, one more example of dumbing down the language to cater for ignoramuses. The old sign, saying St Mary's Terrace, was rescued from the Council's dump, renovated and reinstalled. Interesting to read that parents think schools should place more emphasis on preparing children for grown-up life rather than preparation for academia. Am I missing something here? Isn't that what parenting is for?

Reading my daily newspaper I omit completely news about the conflicts raging many miles away on the grounds that I can do nothing to help matters except, perhaps, pray. I cannot understand why some countries would wish to destroy others. I would have to delve into at least 2000 years of history to attempt to obtain an inkling of why atrocities occur. This I do know, however. The quicker racism and antisemitism are stamped out the better we shall all be. Leave the Jewish people alone to live in peace and harmony. Bearing in mind my liberal ethos and my interest in the travelling folk I would like to meet a Jewish gypsy. That really would be a double whammy.

What are we to think about mighty mouth Lee Anderson, the Conservative Party's deputy chairman, chuntering that building accommodation on one of Orkney's 50 uninhabited islands for the Home Office to process asylum claims would be "job done"? Let's assume that he's serious. There are 70 islands in the Orcadian archipelago, 20 of them inhabited, some with very few people. Be that as it may, has Mr Anderson not asked himself why the other 50 are uninhabited? It is simply because they cannot sustain human life. There are no facilities that folk take for granted - utilities, infrastructure, transport, no trees, 18 hours of winter darkness, rain (often). Even with, as Anderson asserts, "decent accommodation", the immigrants must cope with no shops, schools, entertainments etc. He probably expects them to swim to Mainland Orkney for provisions, there being no ferries or aeroplanes available. As I may have mentioned before Anderson is to Sunak what Prescott was to Blair, the token nincompoop hanging around to make them look intelligent. Compared to these clowns the village idiot would seem like a member of Mensa.

I love it when folk, particularly politicians, have a go at Tim Martin, Chairman of pub chain Wetherspoons. Does he care? I'm guessing not. Since the year 2000 a quarter of pubs have closed but Tim (now Sir Tim) Martin and his empire go gaily marching on. His knighthood was awarded for services to hospitality and culture which no doubt caused even more

spluttering noises from the middle classes. Wetherspoons taxes are paid in this country unlike some other alleged Brexiteers who shifted their businesses abroad. The pubs are certainly not perfect. Traditionalists, and I am one, will say that they are too large; there are no seats at the bar and standing at them is discouraged; the staff are youngsters earning the minimum wage who cannot converse with the customers; service at the bar is random; there are these infernal gambling machines. However, the products are cheap and palatable. The food is not haute cuisine but it is tasty and filling and while the going rate hereabouts for steak and chips is around £26-30, Wetherspoons charges half that. The cost of a medium glass of wine in local pubs ranges from £6-8 whereas a large glass of similar vintage in Spoons is less than £3.50. For me, the greatest value Wetherspoons has given to culture is the saving and renovation of historic buildings. For example, what would have happened to the King's Head in Beccles if Wetherspoons had not rescued it? I rest my case.
