### News from Wangford Church


We hope that everybody had a nice Christmas and wish you all the very best for 2021.

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### ABRAHAM

A German Jew named Eddie Jaku is 100 years old and has been domiciled in Australia since 1950. He has written a book, which is selling very well, entitled The Happiest Man on Earth. His story defies belief, having survived Kristallnacht, imprisonment in Buchenwald and Auschwitz, Josef Mengele, a death march, torture and much more. He survived because he had a skill as a mechanical engineer and, therefore, was deemed an "economically indispensable Jew". When liberated he weighed barely 5 stone, and was skeletal. He returned to Brussels but felt no joy having lost his home, family and some 100 relatives. Fortunately, he found his friend Kurt, whom he had met in the camp, and his sister. He married another Jewish survivor and moved to Australia. By all accounts he has since had a happy, successful life, now living with his wife in a care home. He calls himself the happiest man because he has children, grandchildren and great grandchildren..."everything I ever dreamed of". In his book he refers to the power of love and why we should renounce hatred ... "It may kill your enemy, but it will destroy you in the process". There is also ultimate sadness, however, in that he has never returned to the fatherland. "I'm ashamed to be German. This was the elite who did this to us, not the sweepers, labourers and bricklayers, but the doctors, lawyers and architects. The cream of Germany were our guards and our torturers and you want me to forgive? Never!"

Which brings to mind a tale of my own. Some years ago I became involved with an elderly Jewish couple, splendid people, Michael and Rebecca (a very protective wife). Michael was Austrian and in Britain had been in the rag trade. I was helping them with a planning problem. That is by the way but I mention it to show where I came in. Along the way we enjoyed cups of tea and exchanged personal information. At some point I asked him if he still had anyone back in Austria, and he replied in the quietest, gentlest voice, "No. I was the only one of my family to walk out of the camp alive". Like Jaku, when he emerged, aged 16, he was skeletal and grossly underweight. At some stage he showed us his numbers and told us later that he was ever grateful to the British Government. He and a little band of companions were brought to England, given a small sum of money, a suit of clothes and a room in which to live and were wished well. I know that Michael worked hard, made a success of his business and had a contented life in dear old Blighty with Rebecca and their daughter. I did not ask him if he forgave. For sure he couldn't forget.

I know that I mentioned previously that these scribblings should not be used as an advertising agency for books. Aside from newspapers, which mostly contain gloom, despondency, drivel, and trivia, I like to read biographies/autobiographies of people who interest me - mostly literary and show-biz figures. Mrs Abe continues, I am glad to say, to ply me with volumes to such an extent that we need a bigger house. But I digress. Rapidly coming to the point, of all the autos I have read this one must rank among the best, if not the best. It entertained and horrified me in equal measures. It is by a man unjustly vilified and all but cancelled. Even if you have never seen or liked his films, give this one a go - Woody Allen 'Apropos of Nothing'.

I take no credit for this and I paraphrase a cracking point made

to a national newspaper. The BBC is reported to intend to secure a workforce that is 50% female, at least 20% black, Asian and minority ethnic and 12% disabled, echoing the boss's pronouncement that "White men's control of the news agenda must end". I make no comment on that but note that there is no mention of what proportion will be allocated for the brightest, most able and the ones judged most suitable for the job.

An article in the EADT recently caught my eye. The government's suggested new planning reforms was the subject and the commentator was James Hopkins. He makes many good points, particularly, close to my heart, about Local Authority planning teams being smaller than ever and grossly under- resourced. Where we diverge however is his welcomed proposal upon the emphasis on beautiful development, stressing the careful, quality design of Hopkins Homes. That may be, but I maintain that developments of the sort that Hopkins Homes are turning out are so prolific that they in turn will turn out to be ordinary 'anywhere type housing' not related to the Suffolk vernacular or palette. In effect – "Legoland'.

We enter another year under circumstances never before known to most of us, but with good common sense, kindness and fortitude, qualities that Suffolk folk have in abundance, we shall survive and thrive. Happy New Year to all.

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### Ready, steady, census

Households across our communities will soon be asked to take part in Census 2021.

The census is a once-in-a-decade survey that gives us the most accurate estimate of all the people and households in England and Wales. It has been carried out every decade since 1801, with the exception of 1941.

It will be the first run predominantly online, with households receiving a letter with a unique access code, allowing them to complete the questionnaire on their computers, phones or tablets.

"A successful census will ensure everyone from local government to charities can put services and funding in the places where they are most needed," Iain Bell, deputy national statistician at the Office for National Statistics, said. "This could mean things like doctors' surgeries, schools and new transport routes. That's why it is so important everyone takes part and we have made it easier for people to do so online on any device, with help and paper questionnaires for those that need them."

Census day will be on March 21, but households across the country will receive letters with online codes allowing them to take part from early March.

The census will include questions about your sex, age, work, health, education, household size and ethnicity. And, for the first time, there will be a question asking people whether they have served in the armed forces, as well as voluntary questions for those aged 16 and over on sexual orientation and gender identity.

Results will be available within 12 months, although personal records will be locked away for 100 years, kept safe for future generations.
