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Jean Johnston Burns RIP

Saturday 6th November saw the COVID-delayed memorial service for Wangford resident Jean Burns, who died on 18th March 2020 at the age of 90, take place at St Peter and St Paul, Wangford. A large congregation of family and friends, many of whom had travelled some distance, joined villagers for an uplifting celebration of Jean's life.

Jean was born an only child in 1929 in Ramsbottom, Lancashire. She was brought up with her cousin, also called Jean, almost as twins, wearing the same clothes. Her teenage years during WW2 were spent at Bury Grammar School, but she did not have much social life. When she left school, she was interested in floristry, but her father, after losing his music retail business in the Depression, insisted that she get a 'proper' job. She therefore enrolled at Ripon St. Margaret's Ladies' College on a teaching course, where, at a May Ball she met Charles Burns, an officer cadet from Glasgow.

Charles's parents arranged a soirée (actually more of an interview) where Jean was even expected to play the piano. She passed muster, and she and Charles were married in Bury Parish Church in 1952. Charles, a Royal Engineer, was promoted to captain, and posted to a huge house in Germany when Jean was eight months pregnant. Ross was born in the army hospital in Munster. Subsequently posted to Osnabruck, Jean gave birth to Nigel, who arrived early, on the sofa at home. Back in the UK, Alastair was born in Chatham, but Caroline was born just before Christmas 1960 in Nairobi. Jean loved living in Kenya.

However, independence in 1963 meant they left and moved back to the UK, and Jean started a private nursery school in Digswell, Hertfordshire, and remained its head until her retirement. However, she did not have an easy life, as her husband died from Parkinson's in 1991, and she lost her sons Nigel and Ross.

Nevertheless, as she had done throughout her life, she made the best of it and looked forward. In 1993 she began to forge a new life for herself, and moved to Oak House in Wangford with Michael, where they established an active social life in the village and beyond. They shared a passion for seeing the world, and went on many cruises, visiting every continent. When Jean was struck down with pulmonary fibrosis, they still continued to travel, with Mike supervising and monitoring all the medical equipment that made it possible.

Jean loved cooking - her cordon bleu supper parties in Wangford were renowned. She was also very creative, with an eye for colour; she loved painting, and made elegant clothes for herself, often with miniature copies for Caroline, her only daughter.

Her grandchildren shared many memories of her - lovely holidays, wonderful food, kindness, strength. She was always glamorous, taking great pride in her appearance, and was not only a great story-teller, but also an amazing listener.

For Jean, the most important things in her life were her family and Mike. She had a deep Christian faith, and she believed that at the end she was going to a better place with no more pain and suffering.

Her memorial service was a real family affair, with tributes from her children and grandson Robert, and lovely singing by her granddaughters Emily and Rebecca. Piper David Harper, in full Scottish attire, closed the service with 'Amazing Grace' and other Scottish melodies.

Wangford Men's Breakfast

The Men's Breakfast resumed with a small group meeting on November 20th at The Angel. The breakfast was generous, with some breakfasters saying they would not need any lunch, and one saying he wouldn't need to eat for the rest of the day.

Barrie Slatter led a discussion about the cause of global warming and showed that carbon capture could be boosted with changing our diets; pigs and poultry are much better than beef, lamb or venison. In the short term grasses are better carbon captors than trees which take tens of years to be significant. Barrie explained that we need to be more dependent on hydrogen as a fuel, which like water we can store, rather than hydrocarbon fuel sources. We are unable to store solar power or wind efficiently; wave power is constant, tidal currents as in the North Sea are always available. To help to combat global warming solar energy, using solar PV panels, needs to be developed as it is a clean source of energy feeding into the National grid.

The breakfasters thanked Barrie for an interesting and thought-provoking discussion.

Book Club

At our December meeting we discussed Stef Penney's "Under A Pole Star". This book had a divided response but we all generally agreed that the description of the Arctic Circle, Eskimo culture and the harshness of life in such extreme conditions was very well executed. This is a long story and many of us felt it was unnecessarily so at almost 600 pages. The author used navigation as both the purpose of the book and also as a narrative device. Parts of the book were headed by a constellation description and each chapter was fixed in place by coordinates. This augmented the feeling of a journey both in terms of exploration and personal journeys.

The story is centred around Flora who at 12 years old went to Greenland and the Arctic Circle with her father on his whaling boat. This started her need to reach places few knew existed. W e experienced exploration in the 1880s through the difficulty of obtaining funding to undertaking the journey and the clashes and friendships that came from shared experience. conditions and climate were harsh. There were boats from USA and UK and each had the desire to map and claim previously unknown areas of land. This did not always bring out the best in people. We were shocked and uncomfortable when the USA boat brought back Eskimos to New York as a form of exhibit but they could not cope with the modern world, were unhappy, and became ill.

Running alongside the exploration was the relationship between Flora and Jakob which, like the tide, ebbed and flowed. Flora told her own story as an older woman through a memoir and talking to a journalist who turned out to be Jakob's nephew. Some commented that Flora was not likeable- she was married when she started her relationship with Jakob and decided that she could not have the baby she was expecting. Her single-mindedness enabled her to carry on with the work she felt destined to do but there was a personal cost. Definitely a thought-provoking book.

We next meet on Thursday 6th January to discuss Francis Spufford's "Light Perpetual" at 8pm in the Community Centre.
