#### JULY'S TEAM LETTER

#### Dear Friends

On Sunday 15th July at St Andrew's Walberswick we are holding an open-air celebration service in the ruins of the church. Bishop Mike Harrison, Bishop of Dunwich, is coming to join us, and he will lead prayers for the rededication of the newly restored ruins. We hope that many from the village community will come to the service. Music will be led by a band, and after the service we hope that people will eat their picnics on the grass, raise a celebratory glass and enjoy a piece of celebratory cake. Hopefully the sun will shine and a happy morning will be enjoyed by everyone.

The service marks the completion of a conservation project that has stabilised the ruins, ensuring that the fragile stonework is safe. It is a major liability on a small PCC to be responsible for extensive ancient ruins, and we are grateful to Historic England for the grant support.

When first built, St Andrew's Walberswick was the same size as St Edmund's Southwold and Holy Trinity Blythburgh. Simon Jenkins writes that once it was a "mighty galleon" of a church. It was built during the second half of the fifteenth century reflecting the confidence in late medieval religion and the wealth of East Anglia. By 1696 however times had changed and the mighty structure must have been in a state of decay. It was too big for the small congregation, who decided to downsize. The church was unroofed, and the smaller church we see today was built within the shell of the earlier south aisle. I wonder how the church members felt when they took that decision? Were they saddened at an apparent decay in church life, or heartened by escaping a major liability? They took a brave and controversial decision. Could any of us imagine tackling such a decision today!

The churchwardens of 1696 would be astonished to know that in 2017 state funding would conserve the ruins of the church that they had abandoned, and that the community would gather in celebration of those ruins. I like to imagine that they would be thrilled, and that they would praise God for his faithfulness in every generation. In the hymn, "Abide with me" is the line, "change and decay in all around I see: O thou who changest not, abide with me." What might be perceived in human terms as change, decline and decay is, from God's perspective, part of the ongoing story of his church. That is a story of change, adapt ation, renewal, new growth and new life. Christ died, was buried, but rose again to new life. In each generation of the church the same pattern is followed. The church family gives of itself in seeking to serve Christ in its own time and place. That might look very different to what happened in the past, but is obedient to Christ's call today. Tomorrow new life will grow from what is done today, and the life of the church continues in each generation.

Our ancient church buildings tell the story of many earlier generations of Christians who have served Christ and served one another in past years. Conserving, adapting and enhancing those buildings means that they stand testimony to a living faith. Our church buildings point backwards into history. They are a testimony to the lively faith of our forebears. They give us confidence that our faith has been tested by those who have gone before, and been proved to be true. Our church buildings point to the future and the life of the church tomorrow. It will be different from what has gone before, but it will also be a lively faith, sincere, sometimes tested but also alive and true.

I hope and pray that Sunday 15th July will be a happy day in Walberswick, a first day in God's new tomorrow.

#### **BOOK CLUB**

At our June meeting we discussed Elly Griffiths' book 'The Woman in Blue'. The book is part of a series and although it can be read as a 'stand alone' many of the references would have made better sense if we had read the earlier books in her Ruth Galloway series. It was engaging and atmospheric but rushed at the end. Set in Walsingham, Norfolk, against the religious history of the shrine, three murders are committed and Dr Ruth Galloway and DCI Nelson set out (in their different ways) to find out who did it and why.

Characterisation and plotting were good, although we felt there were too many 'types' of people. We also felt that just as we were being submerged in the story something would happen to jolt us into reality and awareness that it was just a story which was unsettling. We discussed the prevalent imagery throughout the book - the divine nursing mother Mary depicted in blue and the somewhat secret cult of worshipers (the lactans) that Ruth Galloway unearthed which was pitted against Nelson's police work and finding a (spurious) link between victims and suspects of a woman who had fostered many children over the years. In summary, the book was liked by the majority but would have been better if we had read the earlier books first.



#### **ABRAHAM**

As I get older I find myself unexpectedly thinking of places in which my caravanserai has rested, all too briefly in some cases, and pondered which, if any, I have called home. The wee Kingdom town of Tannochbrae where I was born and stopped for twenty two years should have a strong claim and might well do if I had been a happy wee boy, but alas. The next stop was an unattractive town west of Paisley where a year's dalliance made no lasting impression, although I did meet a grand chum. Next, for another one year sojourn, was a lovely town in the north east of the land of the barbarians where I acquired Mrs Abe and a little girl, but too short a time to claim my affections. Three years in East Anglia were insufficient to call home, but thirty four vears in south west Essex held me long enough to cement us, and any small pin prick I made on society surely happened there. Lastly, (or not, as the case may be) back to dear old East Suffolk, where I have been happier than anywhere. I may have remarked elsewhere that I am a late starter in almost everything, but it's never too late, and these past twelve years have finally taught me that what truly makes a home is the sight of a little pussy cat wandering to the front door and claiming me as its own. Cracked it. Wherever I lay my moggie, that's my home.

I recently had occasion to complete an application form in order to do some voluntary work. I thought, blimey, why at my age should I have to do this, but then thought again how conceited and arrogant am I to assume that the recipient knew to accept me without some information, and, wait for it - two references, for goodness sake.

Be that as it may I was required to state previous volunteering jobs I had done and I remarked to Mrs Abe that I had done nothing in this way. Hold on, she remarked and proceeded to reel off the stuff I had actually done. While not exactly earth-shattering at least it was something. The point is that, in the main, we are too self-effacing. Because we have likely lived unnoticed, saved no lives, fought no wars, never played for England or produced a great piece of literature, does not mean that our existence has been, or will continue to be useless. At an advancing age we may conclude that it is too late and just end up festering, leading an existence waiting for it to end. That does not make you a bad person. But there is another option. Take part, use what experience your long life and wisdom has given you, take a few risks to make up for lost time. There are volunteers required everywhere and this does not necessarily entail hiking off to Africa or the like. Look around your own village and environs, there is much to be done and enjoyed.

The latest crackerjack, back of a fag packet idea from Michael Gove, Secretary of State for the Environment, is to prevent the use of wood burning stoves and probably open fires. What house in he country, especially up north does not rely upon heating the rooms by solid fuel, particularly logs, and not just in winter? Very welcoming and cheerful to look at, will we be doomed to stare at radiators or storage heaters, or crawl off to bed to keep warm? My chum John and many others will lose out on exercising by not chopping and humping. Architecturally, there will be no need for real chimneys and who wants to see a house without, such feature being the external soul of the cottage? Rural pubs will again lose out. Who is not attracted on a wild wintry evening by the lights and welcoming blaze of a fire? And, at Mrs Abe's pre-new year bash how will the old folk be toasted?

As I have told you umpteen times, I can't help it.
