Norfolk and Waveney 's COVID-19 vaccination programme continues to make good progress as it was revealed that more than a third of people in the area have received their first dose of vaccine.

Data from NHS England shows that 34.9% of people aged over 16 have received a first dose of vaccine, ranking Norfolk and Waveney third out of 42 health systems in England. The national average is 28%.

The figures show 297,668 patients received at least one dose of the vaccine by February 14.

Census 2021

Census day is Sunday 21st March. This will be the first time that the census is conducted primarily online, with a target of 75% of responses completed online.

You must complete the census by law. If you do not, or if you supply false information, you could be fined up to £1,000. However, one or two questions are clearly labelled as voluntary.

A letter will be sent to each address in March with a unique online access code and instructions. Any household will be able to receive a paper form on request, and households in some areas will receive a paper form to start with. (Editor: the mechanism for doing this is proving difficult to unearth!)

If you need it, you are encouraged to ask for help from family and friends in completing the form, and Wangford-Help and Uggeshall Coronavirus Community Support are also here to offer support.

Southwold Rapid COVID-19 testing site

One of Suffolk's 16 new rapid testing sites will open at Stella Peskett Hall, Southwold on 3rd March.

These sites are aimed at people who don't display any COVID-19 symptoms but cannot work from home, and are being encouraged to get tested twice a week.

The test involves taking a swab of the nostrils and throat, and takes around 15 minutes. It is free, and results are sent by email or text within around an hour.

MARCH'S TEAM LETTER

'The question is not 'Where was God at Auschwitz?' but 'Where was humanity at Auschwitz'?

People search for God not only in places one might expect like Glastonbury Abbey or Lindisfarne, but also in the strangest of places. I am always intrigued when the tabloid press reports on an individual who claims to have found the face of Christ when they happen to cut open a potato or see him in a reflection in a puddle, in a cloud formation or some other random event. I am afraid that my empirical brain demands greater proof than this and so I find myself with the sceptics challenging such a slim piece of evidence.

It was the theologian Maurice Wiles who questioned such forms of evidence, asking why would God appear in such an arbitrary place like a cut-open vegetable but not intervene in events like the Holocaust, other genocides or even a global pandemic?

It was this question that led me to think through the answer to Wiles' question. My answer was inspired by joining in our recent Holocaust Memorial Day which was well attended this year on Zoom. One of the speakers, Doctor Joanna Rustin, spoke to us about Rabbi Hugo Gryn, who was in Auschwitz as a child and towards the end of the war was moved with his father via a death march to a labour camp, called ironically 'Lieberose' or 'Lovely Rose'. Rabbi Gryn recalled Yom Kippur in 1944 where he found a quiet place and tried to remember as many of the prayers for the day as he could. He found himself crying uncontrollably, in a way he never has since and felt that God was crying with him and that he was not abandoned by God. Rabbi Gryn believed this experience enabled him to survive as a person and still value the importance of kindness, friendship, and family life. When people asked him where was God in Auschwitz, his answer was that God was there violated and blasphemed, and the question, he argued, that was the greater, was where was humanity at Auschwitz?

As we journey through Lent, towards Good Friday and Easter and begin to see the dawn of hope with more and more people being vaccinated I believe that we should hold on to Rabbi Gryn's words, that God will never abandon us, and instead of looking for the image of Christ in a potato, perhaps we should look for God in the face of a man on a cross.

Antifreeze poisoning

We have sadly seen several cases of antifreeze (ethylene glycol) poisonings recently. Cats in particular are likely to ingest any spilt antifreeze, and this can be fatal. Symptoms in cats include vomiting, a sleepy depressed demeanor, drunk-like and coordinated state, as well as seizures and difficulty breathing. Signs can begin to show 30 minutes postingestion.

George Samuel Shephard RIP

The funeral service for George, who died peacefully on January 11th aged 86 took place at Waveney Memorial Park and Crematorium on 28th January, attended by family, friends and neighbours.

George was born in Potters Bar in 1934. His maternal grandparents lived in Wangford, and, following his grandfather's death, the family moved here to the house in Church Street where Fay still lives. George attended Reydon school whilst sisters Fay and Jane joined Henham.

During his National Service George served in the Black Watch, and spent time in Germany and British Guiana. Whilst in the army, he became interested in boxing, winning several cups and later representing Suffolk in that sport.

On leaving the army he worked for the famous Garrett engineering firm in Leiston, and then, wanting a change, he trained as a tree surgeon, becoming very successful even though he was scared of heights.

George had many hobbies, including shooting, for which he won many trophies. He was a competent fly fisherman, and travelled all over the UK pursuing the salmon. In later years he took up scuba diving, and swam here and in Malta and the Red Sea. He also taught himself to ride horses, bought a horse box and earned some extra money transporting horses round the area. In his early twenties he even taught himself to play the guitar, and played and sang in local pubs with a group.

George refused to be bored, and grabbed life with both hands. He was a true countryman, and was never happier than when he was out in the Suffolk countryside. He loved all animals, in particular dogs and Siamese cats. In fact, George just loved life

He would not be cowed by illness or injury, and determinedly got himself back to fitness, and also back on his bike, after every setback, until, in late 2020, he fell off and broke his hip. It was particularly sad that, whilst undergoing rehabilitation in a care home, he contracted coronavirus.

The television dramatist Russell T. Davies has come out with some guff suggesting that only gay actors should play gay parts, believing that it gives greater authenticity to the roles. Let's have some fun by looking a wee bit closer at that pious idea. First of all, how to know, unless they have been 'outed'? A whole new aspect to the legendary 'casting couch'? This leads to gays not being permitted to play straights - that's authenticity for you. You can just see the majority of Equity jumping up and down at that. It also conjures up farcical notions such as disabled people only being played by the disadvantaged; Scots, Irish, English Welsh and every other nation only employing actors born therein. How many hunchbacked Frenchmen will be queuing at the doors of Notre Dame and how many peglegs appling to portray Long John Silver? The point about theatre and acting is to give people the opportunity to be what they are not, be it homicidal maniacs, halfwits, lovers, comedians, whatever; to escape for that odd few hours into a world of fantasy, at the same time giving the audience a similar freedom. Mind you, it can create a disaster or two along the way. I am thinking particularly of Mel Gibson's mangled accent in Braveheart, Dick Van Dyke's laughable version of a cockney in Mary Poppins, and an Oscar being awarded to a vastly overrated Jock playing an Irish cop in Chicago with a Scottish accent. When it comes to it, it's just entertainment and as Christopher Lee once pointed out, the purpose of an actor is to

While I'm at it I watched a programme about the composing and production of the hit musical Hamilton, dealing with one of America's founding fathers, Alexander Hamilton. I have no comment to make upon the merits of the show and I am not likely to see it. It intrigued me, however, that the three main characters, including two presidents, all white in real life, were played by black actors. This does not bother me in the slightest, echoing Christopher Lee's words. I am willing to bet, though, if it were the other way round and a white actor was chosen to portray say, Nelson Mandela or Muhammad Ali, the woke brigade would utter howls of protest.

It has long been accepted by fair minded folk that politics and sport should be kept apart. Personally I believe that that particular horse bolted long ago, but let us assume for the argument that it is yet a well-held maxim. No doubt that is why the ruling bodies of golf have no problem with promoting the Royal and Ancient game in the likes of China and Saudi Arabia where, by all accounts, their human rights records leave much to be desired. Why then have the American PGA and our own R & A decided that Trump courses should not be used for championships organised by them? They obviously disapprove of Trump; fair enough, he may well be a complete fruitcake, but what does this have to do with playing golf on his courses? The authorities can't have it both ways. This is double standards and hypocrisy on a monumental scale.

As the twilight of my life is upon me I seem to be giving the land of the barbarians more thought than I have for a long time. This has been exacerbated by Billy Connolly recently extolling its virtues in grand style in Scotland's biggest selling Sunday newspaper, the dreaded Sunday Post*. "I love Scotland with a fierce passion. I love talking about Scotland, and, most of all, I love being there. I have lived in America for many years now but I have never stopped feeling Scottish". Pamela

remarked: "Billy is constantly drawn back to Scotland. It's as though he'd fade into depression without a regular fix"."being Scottish is a lovely thing. Scotland is a unique and wondrous place". I agree with all of that but good manners prevail upon me not to bang on too much about it, although there are moments when it slips out a wee bit strongly. I am proud of being Scottish, especially coming from the 'wee kingdom', and I do love to return every year particularly since I discovered another super place to enjoy off the top of the land. When I hear another Scottish accent from visitors or residents I cannot help engaging in conversation with the stranger. Being proud of where you come from is a weird feeling. Would it make a difference to me were my formative years spent in Glasgow or Birmingham, rather than the attractive rural village that was my home for the first twenty two years? What would I have become if I had not escaped? I do know that I am glad I have been in another country for the greater part of my life and I can view the early fold from afar. Ralph Fiennes was born in Ipswich and spent part of his childhood there, and Wangford. He was given advice from fellow actor Gabriel Byrne -"Whenever there's a big question for you in later life it's very good to go home and walk the paths of your childhood". That is reasonable but not why I do it, which is: 'if you don't go, you can't come back.'

I have recently re-read 'Reflections Of A Southwold GP' by Dr Christopher Hopkins, an utterly charming look back at a long well-led life, the highlight of which for me was his reminiscences of the enjoyment and vicissitudes of working as a rural General Practitioner in this blessed plot where we reside. It resonated with my own memories of childhood in 'Muchty in the fifties when the whole community was served by one doctor and a district nurse. There have been so many changes since and as the Doctor points out finally, not always for the better. The book ends with a fine tribute to his children, but especially to his wife Mary without whom, he makes clear, he could not have achieved his ambitions.

*Now that the barbarians are clamouring again for an independence referendum I remind you what Tom Nairn, political theorist and academic opined - 'Scotland will be reborn the day the last minister is strangled with the last copy of the Sunday Post'.
