Polling Information

The Polling Station at Wangford Community Centre will be open from 7.00 am and 10.00 pm on Thursday 6th May.

To keep everyone COVID-19 safe, there will be a one-way system similar to that used for the flu clinic last November. Entrance will be through the main door, and exit through the Bar and down the ramp. Voters are asked to note that from 1.00 - 3.00 pm the Post Office will be operating in the Bar, and care will need to be exercised on exit to maintain social distancing. Post Office users have been asked to give way to voters who are exiting (see below). Cones outside the building will mark where you should queue, and inside floor markings will indicate where you should wait.

As at all polling stations, face coverings must be worn, the hand sanitizer provided must be used on entry and exit, and 2m social distancing must be observed. Polling staff will be responsible for regular cleaning, and at busy times you may need to wait for a booth to be sanitized. You are welcome to bring your own pen or pencil, but cleaned pencils will be available for each voter.

Please follow any instructions given by the door steward or polling staff so that everyone can vote safely.



Wangford Post Office

The Post Office will be able to open on Polling Day, Thursday 6th May. However, to keep everyone COVID-safe we all need to be vigilant, as the entrance to the Post Office is also the exit from the Polling Station. Post Office customers please check no-one is coming out through the bar before you enter the ramp; give way to them, and make space for them to exit safely.

Road-map permitting, both the Angel and the Plough will reopen for indoor service from May 17th. Indoors and out, it will be table service only under the rule of six or two households, and social distancing and mask wearing will be in force when moving around inside. Food will be served, but, unlike last time, you can order a drink without having to order a meal, and there is no curfew. You will still have to register for track and trace.

Both pubs hope to return to their pre-lockdown opening and food service hours, but do check their websites/ Facebook/notices for up-to-date information.

Dear Friends,

Without doubt, one of the worst consequences of the various Covid-19 restrictions has been the physical separation from loved ones. For Anne and me, our fifth grandchild was born early in lockdown and we have never held him. That is sad for us, but many people have faced heart-breaking sorrow. We have seen images of distraught relatives outside nursing homes, their hands pressed on the outside window of their loved one's room, the closest they could get to physical contact with them.

For many others, that dreadful separation has become permanent, in this world anyway. Almost unbearable pain has been experienced by those whose loved one has passed away all alone, if it were not for the holding hand of one of our amazing and wonderful nurses. We pray that we will be reunited with them, one day, in God's Kingdom.

Separation from loved ones is truly awful. Why, then, were the closest friends of Jesus, those who had spent every day for three years in his company, so full of joy just ten days after he left them, physically, for the last time?

On Thursday 13th May, the Church celebrates the Ascension of our Lord. We ponder the day when his physical presence was withdrawn for the last time, but in so doing he became present with, and available to, all his disciples in every place and in every age.

Then, on Sunday 23rd May, we celebrate the great feast of Pentecost, or Whitsun. Pentecost is often referred to as the birthday of the Church, because it was on the day of Pentecost that the Holy Spirit came upon the disciples, unifying and empowering them as one body, to be Christ's body in the world.

This bunch of timid, cowardly, men, hiding behind locked doors, were completely transformed. Now, they knew no fear. They proclaimed and lived the Good News of Jesus Christ, without fear or favour.

I wonder how many of us have envied the first disciples, feeling that we have missed out by not living alongside him, enjoying his company, listening to him, and being able to ask him questions? But what we do have is wonderful too; we have Christ's Spirit living within us. We do not just have an understanding of Jesus in our heads, we have a relationship with him in our hearts.

Jean Bichara RIP

The funeral service for Jean, who passed away on 11th March, took place at Wangford Church on 25th March.

Beryl Jean Gray was born in Hackney in 1932 at the Salvation Army Mothers' Hospital. Her mother Rita was a 17-year-old unmarried domestic servant, and the Salvation Army arranged for Jean to be fostered and then adopted.

She grew up in London and Wales during the war, a shy child who was always interested in painting and dreamed of being an artist. Her mother died when she was 14, and her father when she was 24. After his death, she took herself to art school in Colchester, and then to Goldsmiths College in London to train as an art teacher. After graduation, Jean taught art in some pretty rough secondary schools, and later went on the design carpets.

For a single lady at that time Jean was adventurous and travelled widely around Europe on the back of a motorcycle, and cycled round Yugoslavia with a friend. She met Pierre one rainy night outside a youth hostel in Venice. They married in 1964 in Nigeria, where Pierre had grown up, and settled in London, where sons Simon and Tim were born in 1968 and 1973.

It was in 1973 that Pierre and Jean decided to have a weekend away, asking his secretary to book 'a hotel by the sea' and ending up at The Swan in Southwold. They were so taken with the area that they bought a small, cold cottage in Wangford that same weekend, buying the house next door in 1978. In 1992 they left London for good, and made Wangford their home.

Jean gave up teaching to raise the children, but her passion for art continued right up to her Alzheimer's diagnosis a few years ago, and she worked in a studio in the garden.


Jean was a quiet person, not at home in large gatherings, but she was kind, gentle, and sincere. She was also great company, with a gift for storytelling. In his eulogy at her funeral, Tim remarked that she used words the way she used to paint in her artwork.

St Paul's words from Corinthians - "And now abideth faith, hope, charity, these three; but the greatest of these is charity" - were read at the funeral, and in his sermon vicar Alan said that Jean personified Paul's words. She always demonstrated humility and gentleness, and lived a life of loving service to her family, and also to those in the wider community, including Wangford church. She was patient, very kind, with not a hint of arrogance or rudeness, and she bore her illness stoically, and kept her faith in God.

Both she and Pierre were members of the church, and served on the PCC, and Jean, who had a lovely singing voice, was a faithful member of the church choir. Three of her fellow choristers, the maximum permitted under the pandemic regulations, came together to pay musical tribute to her, accompanied by two of the organists she had worked with.

Jean, who always said that she wanted to lie down in a country graveyard when she passed away, was buried in the churchyard.

Donations in her memory were invited for the Alzheimer's Society and the Sole Bay Care Fund.

Update on Wangford Community Garden

We are pleased to tell you that the planting of trees, shrubs, bulbs and wildflowers has gone really well. Given the restrictions on how many people can meet, even outdoors, the volunteers including Parish Councillors have exceeded our expectations. I would like to thank all of those that were able to help and for their fantastic support.

The paths are being cut again so access round the garden and to the benches and picnic table will be much easier for when we get the warmer weather. We are also installing a heavy duty mesh path under the grass leading from the Community Centre tarmac to the disabled access picnic table so that wheelchairs and buggies have better access.

Watering the trees and shrubs is going to be important throughout the spring and summer months so don't be surprised to see someone with a hosepipe.

There are plans to bulk up on the bulbs and wildflower seeds next autumn as we were too late to get a large order last year. Please use the garden for meeting people, quiet contemplation and appreciate the increasing wildlife. But don't forget to take your litter home and keep it tidy.
