MAY'S TEAM LETTER

May - a month where nature is full of blossom, birds nesting, everything is greening up, and we are elated after celebrating Christ's resurrection. This year while May has the festivals of the Ascension and Pentecost, in the UK we have a very rare cause of national celebration in the Coronation of King Charles III. Across our land bells will ring out, there will be tea parties, village get-togethers, special music written and performed, church services, concerts and volunteering opportunities. Southwold and Reydon Choral have been busy rehearsing for a Coronation Concert at St Felix Chapel on 9th June . Do come along .

On 6th May I shall be officiating at a wedding in Blythburgh, planned long before the death of Queen Elizabeth and the announcement of the Coronation date. So this happy couple and their guests will have a double cause for celebration. Our bell ringers are ringing for them and then following on with a special peal for the Coronation.

For the last 900 years coronations have taken place at Westminster Abbey, the service usually being conducted by the Archbishop of Canterbury, whose task this been since the Norman Conquest. The Chrism oil which will be used to anoint His Majesty was consecrated in Jerusalem at The Church of the Holy Sepulchre. The oil was made from olives from two groves on the Mount of Olives, at the Monastery of Mary Magdalene and the Monastery of the Ascension. The Monastery of Mary Magdalene is the burial place of His Majesty's grandmother, Princess Alice of Greece. The oil has been perfumed with essential oils - sesame, rose, jasmine, cinnamon, neroli, benzoin and amber - as well as orange blossom. It should give a beautiful aroma.

When the Queen was crowned on 2nd June 1953 in Westminster Abbey it was a sacramental act. Her coronation was televised but one part was considered so sacred it was not shown: her ceremonial robes were removed and she knelt down in a simple white dress and was anointed with Holy Oils. The Holy Spirit was invoked to give her the wisdom, strength and perseverance to take on this awesome role. It was a kind of ordination, a setting apart for a specific holy role. I wonder what differences there shall be in King Charles Coronation service.

Let us pray for and rejoice with our new King Charles III and Queen Camilla and all the Royal Family as they continue to serve the people of this land. Have a wonderful Coronation weekend. Long live the King and Queen!

Sue Mary Benge RIP

A large congregation gathered in Wangford Church on Tuesday 4th April for the service to celebrate Susie's life. Her death on 5th March at the age of only 64 after a sudden serious illness came as a great shock to everyone.

Susie moved to Wangford from Barnet, North London in 2020 during the pandemic. She immediately built friendships within the church and village, and with people who had similar interests, including singing in a number of choirs and being part of the Women's Fellowship. She took on the role of church Safeguarding Officer with enthusiasm, and always ensured there were refreshments at PCC meetings. She loved living in Wangford, being part of the village, the view of the church from her cottage where she lived with her beloved cat Alfie Button, and the proximity to the sea.

Susie had a positive impact on the lives of many people. Her caring qualities were demonstrated by her many years as a social worker, helping children and families with learning disabilities, and more recently as a volunteer with the Samaritans, as well as volunteering at a local hospice and other charity work.

She was cheerful, enthusiastic, generous and empathetic, with a good sense of humour, and was always the first to step forward to help anyone in need.

Family life was very important to Susie, and she had four children - Holly, Matthew, Peter and Rosie - and was an older sister to Beverly and David, as well being grandma to Mala and Verity.

The large congregation and a choir formed from her chorister and clergy friends was testament to the number and strength of the friendships she formed over just a short time in Suffolk. Her coffin left the church as the choir sang a setting of the Prayer of St. Francis of Assisi, which perfectly encapsulated her life and work:

> Make me a channel of your peace. Where there is hatred, let me bring your love. Where there is injury, your pardon, Lord, and where there's doubt, true faith in you.

O master, grant that I may never seek so much to be consoled as to console, to be understood as to understand, to be loved as to love with all my soul.

Make me a channel of your peace. Where there's despair in life, let me bring hope. Where there is darkness, only light, and where there's sadness, ever joy.

Make me a channel of your peace. It is in pardoning that we are pardoned. In giving of ourselves that we receive, and in dying that we're born to eternal life.

ABRAHAM

For all I know Gary Lineker may well be an amiable friend and pleasant company. From being a reasonable footballer to making a career as a presenter and crisp seller is to be admired. Whether or not he is worth £1.35 million a year is doubtful, and after you add his income from advertising crisps, it means that he is trousering a shed-load of dosh. And he is entitled to his opinions other than footballing ones. But who is interested in his views on the state of the nation? Scarcely anyone, I would vouch. There are probably many more ex-footballers out there who could do the job as well as Lineker and at much less cost. Of course, the real villains of the piece are the BBC who capitulate when those who earn over-inflated salaries throw a hissy fit, but who at the same time intend to axe the famed BBC Singers (now apparently reprieved) - which indicates that their managers know the price of everything and the value of nothing. Just another botchup by dear old Auntie.

I may have given the impression now and then that I am a technophobic Luddite with my occasional rants about iphone thingies, or whatever they're called. I dare say that if I had a use for one I would acquire such a device, but I cannot believe that their fixation in public buildings and places is entirely necessary. Don't people go to restaurants, pubs, galleries, museums etc. to relax, converse and escape from the pressures of society? I bring this subject up because I read that so many local authorities are dispensing with pay and display parking machines, meaning that if you do not have a smartphone you will not be able to park without incurring a financial penalty. If you are an older person who is reliant upon your vehicle for getting around and do not own a smartphone, you will have no legal means of parking it.

A few more books from the shelves...A Life of John Buchan 'Beyond The Thirty Nine Steps' by granddaughter Ursula Buchan, herself a noted writer. A doorstopper, this is a book Buchan deserved. Best known for his spy novel The Thirty Nine Steps the man was a veritable industry. He wrote about a hundred books and a thousand articles for newspapers and magazines. (When at Oxford, he was estimated to be the richest student because of his earnings from his writings) We have two more non-fiction downstairs, including The Kirk in Scotland and forty-two of his fiction upstairs. After the publication of The Thirty Nine Steps he stated that his life was never the same again. A scholar, antiquarian, barrister, colonial administrator, journal editor, literary critic, publisher, war correspondent, director of wartime propaganda and member of parliament, Governor-General of Canada, given a state funeral. When, I ask, did he ever find time to sleep?

Mary Brunton - The Forgotten Scottish Novelist (1778-1818), born in Orkney, she died too young to fulfil her true potential; John Bunyan - I love The Pilgrim's Progress; Robert Burns, only four books about the great Scot, again died too early; Truman Capote, probably best known for his novella, Breakfast at Tiffany's, successfully filmed; Lewis Carroll - what's to say about this mathematical scholar and genius? And how did this creep in? - We'll always have Casablanca - Story of the movie. If you loved the film, (and who doesn't?) you'll love the book; Raymond Chandler (two volumes), enough said, as is also Agatha Christie; and Slowhand - The Life and Music of Eric Clapton.

Book Club

At our April meeting we discussed Mitch Albom's "The Magic Strings of Frankie Presto". Generally, we all thought this book was excellent. It was very well written and the characters were likable. The narrative began with the death of Frankie Presto - who was a famous musician. The narrator was non-human and referred to itself as a "talent" which we came to see as music. The talent was all-seeing and allknowing and selected those to be blessed (or cursed) with his gift of music. The technique was different to anything we had read before. The narrative was well signposted with dates and events. Mixed into the story were reflections from well-known musicians through time. There were also many links to biblical stories and mythology. We liked the genre of magic realism and the possibilities that it brings. Music was used as the structure and its terms embedded in the narrative. The talent spoke of musical bands as being human relationships, and that music followed us throughout our lives and was there at all the important occasions. We came to see music pushed Frankie and that it was often at the expense of human relationships. He did return to his native Spain towards the end of the story and came to see that El Maestro - his first teacher - was his father and so the circle of his life became complete. The daughter that he and his wife acquired became an equally talented musician. We wondered where her story begins and ends. Definitely a book we would recommend and it generated a lot of discussion. We liked the idea that you may forget many things in your life but not music.

We next meet on Thursday 11th May at 8.00pm in the community centre to discuss Merlin Sheldrake's "Entangled Lives".
