Dog exercise area in Wangford

The Council is considering a number of projects to be funded by money received from the sale of Latitude Festival tickets. We have a proposal for a fully enclosed dog exercise area to be sited on the grassed area adjacent to the allotments, accessed via the gate in Norfolk Road. This area will be enclosed with wire fencing on timber posts, 2 metres high and with two access gates, one double gated for safety. The proposed cost of the scheme is about £3,000. We currently have £17,203 in our Latitude fund, together with £12,200 in our other accounts.

We are seeking villagers' views on this proposal, so please let us know if you think this would be a good or bad facility for the village by contacting Jean Brown, our Clerk, on 01502 675739, or speak to any of the Councillors.





News from Wangford Church

September was a very busy month with a Baptism, Sponsored Ride and Stride, Jazz Concert and the Henham Steam Rally. Happily we were blessed with good weather throughout.

The Jazz Concert in memory of Sidi Scott, which was attended by over 180 people, also heralded the launch of the second Raising the Roof project, this time to repair/replace the roofs over the south nave, chancel and north porch to ensure the long-term viability of the building. The total cost of the work is $\pounds157,000$, for which quite a substantial sum is already available, and we are applying for grants. There is still a long way to go, however, if work is to commence in the Spring. We are inviting folk to buy virtual tiles for $\pounds10$ each, and of course any donations will be much appreciated. Work on the floor tiles is almost complete and has made a huge difference to the overall appearance besides eliminating several safety concerns. Thank you to everyone who has supported this project.

Making a Faith Bridge with Christian Climate Action 7-19 October

To be honest, I'm often overwhelmed by the immensity and impending doom of the climate change discussion, and feel powerless to take positive action to influence those leading environmental and energy policy. I get frustrated by the 'deniers', and yet more frustrated at the inevitable conclusion of MY contribution to the problem, due to the poverty of rural transport and my job based 35 miles away. I'm no Greta Thunberg!


Christian Climate Action (CCA) has encouraged me to consider a new way of responding. Lord Rowan Williams, former Archbishop of Canterbury, building on the St Paul's protest earlier this year, is encouraging people to engage in person, or prayer in an initiative planned in October, to be held outside parliament in Westminster. He says "Christians are called by God to show the world what the divine image looks like- the image of a divine creator who brought the world to birth, called it good, and summoned human beings to reflect his divine care and delight through their own work in the world, animated by the gift of Christ's spirit. Christian Climate Action seeks to respond to that summons. In the face of impending environmental crisis, we need to encourage one another to grow more fully into the joyful responsibility we are made for."

Faith is going to play a pivotal part in the October Rebellion with a "Faith Bridge" signifying bringing Faith and action together. We are asked to imagine a sacred space above the water, formed by the still muttering of 24/7 prayer, a place of prophesy and worship, a space to cry out together and grow hope together. As it says in Romans "Creation waits in eager expectation for the children of God to be revealed" Whether I get to stand side by side in person, or in prayer, has yet to be decided.

BUT, can I find the courage to stand up for the creation that God deemed GOOD, by embodying the sacrificial love Christ taught us, for you, for me, for us and our children and grandchildren? Can I/can we practice a better way of being in this world, recognising and practicing small steps of housekeeping and husbandry, with regularity, for best effect; for all of our futures, in the name and for the sake of our Lord and Saviour Jesus Christ?

Leslie Ronald English RIP

The funeral service for Les, who died on 19th June, took place at Waveney Crematorium on 12th July. Born in Walberswick in 1927, the last of four sons, Les attended Reydon school. He was an all-round sportsman, and loved football, which he would play anywhere; he later became a referee.

His National Service in the Royal Artillery in 1945 took him to Palestine, and North Africa, and on leaving he became a bricklayer in the Southwold area.

On their marriage, he and Joan bought The Cottage in Uggeshall for £600, and Graham and Julie were born in 1956 and 1959 respectively. Joan and Les divorced in 1973.

A staunch Labour supporter, Les was very active in the community, becoming a special constable, a Parish Council member, co-founder of the Henham Steam Rally, and a member of the Wangford Community Council, in which role he raised funds for the building of the Community Centre.

His interests included vintage cars and motor bikes, for which he was the steward at the Steam Rally. He also over the years kept many animals, locally known as the menagerie.

In 2014 Les went into respite care at Stradbroke Court, then to a flat in Marram Green independent living complex in Kessingland. He was diagnosed with dementia in 2015, and moved back to Stradbroke Court shortly before his death.

Philip Anderson RIP

Led by his friend and colleague Robert Foat, the funeral service for Philip, who died suddenly on 18th July, took place on 5th August at Seven Hills Crematorium, Ipswich, a special place for him. His daughters Anna and Fiona, and sons Peter and Nigel paid emotional tributes to their father, and his brother John read, at Philip's special request, the Dylan Thomas poem 'Do not go gentle into that good night'.

Born in Northumberland in 1935, Philip attended Newcastle Royal Grammar School. His first employment was in pig farming, and later he drove lorries, but he had many other jobs during his life.

Philip was a practical man who could turn his hand to anything, as comfortable mixing concrete as he was reading poetry. Extremely intelligent, with a dry sense of humour, he didn't suffer fools gladly, and he always strove to be the best he could at everything.


After the family's first holiday abroad in the Camargue, he decided to study French at night school, and eventually qualified as a teacher of French. Later, he and Margaret became publicans, and after that he became a funeral assistant with Fisher's in Southwold, a place he loved, and where he acquired a reputation in the local community for care and compassion.

Throughout his life he had dogs and other animals, and achieved his dream of owning a horse when he acquired Sooty, a Welsh cob.



ABRAHAM

A reminder of the day of the long-gone heavy horse made me recall my slight memory of these beautiful animals; the baker's and the milkman's carts in my wee village being drawn by them; the Adnams dray wandering through Southwold (could the Company not have kept at least two of them for the tourists?) And this tale of WW1 will touch your wee hearts. Australia sent about 53,000 horses overseas to serve in the various theatres of the war. Of those just one returned to Australia, and he, naturally, was a General's horse. The Anzacs were not permitted to bring their horses back due to quarantine regulations, as it was thought they might spread anthrax. So they were ordered to get rid of their animals. In the European theatre France and Belgium presented no real problem, so the bulk of the horses were sold or given to the peasants and farmers. But in Palestine and the Middle East where the Light Horsemen were stationed, it was not thought proper to leave the animals as it was reckoned that the Arabs treated them very cruelly. Rather than give them away, the Anzacs chose to shoot their horses, and each man shot his best mate's horse. Recalling those awful days, an old Light Horseman called Elijah told of his horse Banjo and his best mate having to shoot him. Even after 70 years Elijah's eyes filled with tears. He had forgotten the names of his mates, but he remembered Banjo because he had saved his life umpteen times.

In the words of a beautiful song lamenting the final days of the Clydesdale entitled 'The Last Trip Home' :

As we head back, oor friends have lined The road tae be there one last time For nane of them would want to miss The chance to see us pass like this They'll say they saw in years to come The muckle horses' last trip home

So steady, boys, walk on Our work is nearly done Nor more we'll till or plough the fields The horses' day is gone An' this will be our last trip home So steady, boys, walk on.

Let us give thanks and try to support all the animal sanctuaries throughout the land and The Suffolk Punch Trust at Hollesley for preserving, and perpetuating the memory of, these wondrous beasts.

Lord, give me strength! A comprehensive school turned away children for not wearing the new 'gender-neutral' uniform. Some girls were wearing skirts, golly gosh, instead of the regulation grey trousers and, wait for it, two community police officers were recruited to enforce non-attendance. This must be a first - the police keeping children away from school. Why don't the nutters allow boys and girls to be exactly that?

My last word on the wee Angel - for now. Talking to two visiting strangers one evening in the pub, after the gentleman had just scoffed delicious pork wrapped in parma ham, his comment was "This was a good find", meaning both food and house. Nice one, Mr Moss.

Book Club

At our September meeting we discussed 'The Only Story' by Julian Barnes. We all agreed that it was very well written. The book had a biographical stance and told the story of Paul's great love with Susan. It was very well constructed and the narrative stance changed from first person to second person and to third person as the speaker (Paul) began to distance himself from the story he was telling. We felt that it was truthful and not overly sentimental which made it feel real. Paul was considerably younger than Susan and their affair was scandalous in the village. We came to see the difficulties their relationship faced and how in living together everything disintegrated due to Susan's dependency on alcohol. In the end Paul could not save Susan and in his words 'handed her back' to her daughter. It was fun, happy and sad in equal measure. Some parts of the story were rather tedious and drawn out. It was one dimensional in that we never heard a voice from anyone else to balance what Paul was saying. In summary, we would recommend this book and it generated a lot of discussion.
