# OFFSHORE WIND POWER LANDFALL

Have your say!

Whilst most people around here agree that renewable energy is the way forward to mitigate climate change, we have to be ready to challenge the latest proposals from the National Grid and its partners.

Initial plans were to bring power from offshore and Holland onshore near Leiston, with a substation at Friston, but due to objections about the impact on an area of outstanding natural beauty, alternatives, including landfalls north of Southwold, and at Walberswick are now being considered, and are subject to (non-statutory) consultation. There has been little by way of public information, and some of the exhibitions about the proposals have already taken place. The next (and last) exhibition is on Friday 6th October 2023 from 2.00pm to 8.00pm at Leiston Community Centre IP16 4IU.

There are also two webinars, where the project team will provide an overview of the proposals on

Tuesday 17 October 2023 at 7.00 - 8.30pm and Wednesday 18 October 2023 at 7.00 - 8.30pm.

Information from SASES (Substation Action/Save East Suffolk) is also available at Wangford Village Store.

If the landfall north of Southwold were to be approved, Wangford and Reydon would be greatly impacted by the construction of a cable corridor (or pylons) on agricultural land and adjacent to an area of outstanding national beauty, as well as by the increased construction traffic on rural routes not designed for that purpose.

Suitable alternative brownfield sites, such as at Bradwell, have been identified, and have been championed by Therese Coffey, MP, Environment Secretary.

The consultation closes on Friday 8th November.



# **OCTOBER'S TEAM LETTER**

#### Chestnuts

In October the chestnut trees drop all their wonderful leaves and chestnuts. In Spring their glorious pink and white candles emerge from sticky buds and through summer the trees offer restful shade. I think they come into their glory in autumn. Chestnuts cradled in that prickly outer husk are stunningly beautiful when you look really closely at them. That smooth nut polished like rosewood. Some people leave them in corners of their homes to keep spiders away. I'm not convinced. Chestnuts are like some people who can be very prickly outside but once you get to know them you find a softer more likeable centre. Have you ever stopped to think why they are so prickly? People will often appear as hard and prickly to protect themselves. Perhaps they have been very hurt along life's way and this is their way of coping. It takes time, patience and sensitivity to get to know the real person. As a priest I have the privilege of being with people at their most joyous and their most vulnerable and sad times. Visiting people at home and in care homes, I saw that some people had wonderful relationships with their family, other residents and their carers. It was a loving two way relationship. On the other hand, I saw other souls who were always critical of their family (who then rarely visited unless they were very saintly!), who complained of having no friends and who treated professional carers abominably. Getting to know the latter type of person, so often I discovered some very deep hurt from the past or a deep rejection they had suffered. They were so wounded, they developed this hard carapace and that biting tongue. That incredibly wise and humble person the late Archbishop Desmond Tutu reminds us that there is nothing we can do to make God love us more and equally there is nothing we can do to make him love us less. Somehow like the prickly chestnut we need to allow a little crack to open up so that our inner hurt and wound can receive the warmth of love, forgiveness, peace and mercy from Christ our Lover and Redeemer and also from friends and our communities that can heal us and allow the crack to open wide so at last the prickly carapace falls of and reveals the beautiful soul hiding inside.

Loving God we thank you for the enormous pleasure of gathering hundreds of conkers, the free gift from the chestnut tree. You provide many times over and yet while there is enough to go round on our planet home, we do not share it equally, we plunder and despoil our globe. Help us curb our greed. The chestnut tree will soon shed her leaves and become skeletal in winter, reminding us that there is beauty in old age and that death is a prelude to new birth.

#### A Churchyard Tribute to George

George Ives will be missed by so many in the village and on behalf of Wangford Church PCC, we would like to acknowledge the years of care and effort he gave to Wangford Churchyard. In his final days, George reminded us that the church hedge should be trimmed in September and from his bed, was pleased to hear the sounds of the grass being cut. We shall miss the man, his cheerful disposition, annual bulb planting programme and willingness to organise the PCC resources to maintain the churchyard.

George and Sue – both accomplished musicians – have arranged Charity concerts, and music to fundraise for the Church with world class musicians taking part. George knew how important the church and graveyard is to villagers – and visitors – and as Churchwardens we hope we can maintain the high standards that he set. The PCC is grateful for the help it receives – both financial and practical – from the Parish Council , paid workers and volunteers who help cut and strim the grass, look after the War Memorial and maintain the gate and signboards.

Following the loss of George, we would greatly value someone coming forward to continue the organisation of the churchyard work – the majority of which is carried out by paid operatives.with the help of the Churchwardens and P.C.C.

George organised seasonal Work Parties and we would like to continue this practice – usually on a Saturday morning. Please look out for dates of the next "Churchyard Clean Up" and help if you can. Coffee and cakes are provided!

One outstanding problem is the suckers of the Ailanthus Altissima (Trees of Heaven) which are engulfing the lower rear churchyard area. On professional advice, these require major work: cutting down to ground level and ongoing cutting back. It will be a big operation and will take time to achieve the results we want. If you feel you are able to help with this project, we would be very glad to hear from you (please!).

Finally, something that made George very happy during his final illness: the grave of William & Alma Smith has been cleaned and restored and will be rededicated on 4th November. George was fascinated by this story of this Wangford Headmaster, who gave 30 years of service to the village, only to be wrongly accused of spying during WWI.

A Memorial and Thanksgiving Service for George will be announced shortly.

#### Book Club

At our September meeting we discussed "Machines Like Me" by Ian McEwan. This was a book that met with a mixed reception. Set in the 1980s amidst a mixture of historical events from the past including the Falklands war where Argentina was victorious, Margaret Thatcher was forced from office, the UK left Europe and there was general unrest. Alan Turing had not died in the 1950s but was working in artificial intelligence and had created Adam and its female counterpart Eve. This felt like a dystopian society and the main character Charlie was rather dysfunctional with a chequered past and unusual view of the world powered by a computer where he gambled, won and lost money on the markets, and played games. He spent his inheritance on buying an Adam and with the girl upstairs (Miranda) they each created half of Adam's personality. We talked about the difference and similarities in Adam as a creation powered by artificial intelligence and the representative human Charlie - particularly in their individual relationships with Miranda. We noted that Adam did express feelings and he was also quite literal and moral. He was upset when he heard that his counterpart robots had used their "kill" switch to end their existence as living was very hard in the human world. Adam was financially successful with investing in the stock market and earned Charlie a fortune. However, he decided that he would use the money he earned to pay outstanding tax on Charlie's behalf and nearly all the balance monies was sent to charity. Miranda lied in a criminal case to get justice for her friend. Adam forced her to confess and Charlie drove her to the police station. She served a long sentence. We talked about how humans manage themselves, including ideas, morality and politics and whether we could truly replicate ourselves in another form and whether we would really wish to do that. We also clearly saw the shortcomings in the human condition. In summary, a book that generated a lot of discussion. We next meet on Thursday 5th October at 8 pm in the Community Centre to discuss Claire Fuller's "Unsettled Ground".
