Up on high at Wangford Church

Vicar Alan somewhat nervously ventured up with church architect Alan Greening to inspect the work on the roof. After taking off the pantiles, all the construction of the nave south roof was found to be in good condition; perhaps surprisingly so, but all appears to have been cleaned out at the same time as the south lead gutters were renewed 30 years or so ago.



There are no major constructional defects apart from one or two instances of timber decay at the lower edges of some rafters where the water has got in through the pantiles, but nothing of significance. All can now be recovered and with a bat-safe membrane for the future. No bats were evident.



Dog thefts

Recently Suffolk has seen a huge increase in the theft of dogs. These have been taken from their own gardens or kennels, from outside shops etc, from elderly people or children just walking, or from cars. Thieves seem to be canvassing properties, especially in rural areas, and marking them with white paint.

Stolen dogs are sold on for breeding, resale, ransom - or, most horrific of all, for baiting or fighting.

All local vets and animal charities are advising you to keep your dogs safe by never leaving them alone outside, even on your own property, never letting another person walk your dogs, and never leaving them outside shops or unattended in the car.

Make sure your dog is microchipped, and the details are up to date, so that, if the worst happens, they might be traced. It doesn't seem to matter if your dog is pedigree or crossbreed; they all have a value to these criminals.

SEPTEMBER'S TEAM LETTER

Contemplating Prayer

Looking toward autumn in this strange year, it's probable we've had more time than usual for prayerful reflecting and contemplation of our lives and relationships. In the absence of common gathered worship, we developed new virtual habits of being church and witnessing to Christ in the community, until we could meet together again.

As I write, I'm still remote working from home on project development and clinical governance work. Both support improved standards to deliver better patient care. Alongside that a project closer to home has also emerged, building on an idea discussed with Sarah Wallington Smith, and my colleagues.

Sarah and I want to offer a short course offering an opportunity to explore and understand new approaches to different, deeper ways of praying. In this 'Introduction to Contemplative Prayer' we invite those interested to explore along these lines: an introduction to an approach, examples of how they can be used or adapted, an opportunity to discuss and try out the idea, then the opportunity to practice it in our own time before the next session. At the next meeting, the intention would be to share our experiences of that approach, before exploring another, in a similar fashion.

We aim to arrange this for end October/November (pre-advent) and at present are just looking for expressions of interest. Due to uncertain times we are likely to set this up as a 'virtual' group meeting e.g. weekly via Zoom so that whatever the virus has in store for us this winter we can continue to meet. God willing, next year we can meet and develop this work together in shared space face to face.

Through this, we can contemplate a 'Harvest' of prayer for, and within, the team, for ourselves and the world, through learning different ways of withdrawing to a quiet place to pray, as Jesus did.

The importance of words

Whether spoken or written, words can have enormous power and influence. At a Zoom service during lockdown, we listened to the words of Reverend Alan Perry when he made reference to the true story of a local couple who had been treated unjustly over a hundred years ago. The point of the sermon was that sometimes rumour or unguarded words can have truly devastating consequences. The couple concerned were William and Alma Smith, who were the respected headmaster and teacher at Henham and Wangford School.

In 1914 with the outbreak of war, there was a climate of suspicion in the country, and William was reported to the police as a spy, largely because he wasn't a local man – he came from Devon – and his son had lived for a time in Germany. The sermon had the immediate effect for many of us of wanting to know more about this extraordinary local story, so we obtained a copy of Angela's Lawrence's book: 'Rumour'. Having had a career in journalism and broadcasting, Angela had researched the case comprehensively and what emerged was a story of true human tragedy. Both William and Alma had taken their own lives because of the distress that these untrue accusations had caused them. They were both buried in the churchyard at St Peter and St Paul, Wangford near the vestry door, where their daughter Gladys Valletta, who died at eighteen years of age, is also buried. (*Ed: this was unusual at the time, as suicide was still considered a crime, and many suicides were buried outside churchyards without full rites of the Church of England. The involvement of Lord and Lady Stradbroke in the case was presumably the enabling factor).*

However, the grave stones have suffered significant weather damage over the years, which motivated some of us to want to have both graves restored in their memory. To this end, enquiries were made about potential costs, and it was also decided to invite Angela to meet with us to discuss a future visit to talk about her book. On a lovely sunny day in July, a small group of us met in the churchyard at Wangford, and afterwards had lunch together to discuss a possible way forward. The happy outcome is that Angela has been invited to provide a talk at St Peter and St Paul, Wangford, after which there will be an opportunity to ask questions and to purchase her book. This and other fundraising ideas will hopefully contribute to the cost of the graves being cleaned, restored and maintained for the foreseeable future.

She is also hosting weekly online ukulele sessions every Friday morning. There is a beginners and improvers session and every-one is welcome to come along - you just need a ukulele to take part.





ABRAHAM

Reluctant to leave the subject of free speech I mention that an English writer, Evelyn Beatrice Hall (1868-1856) writing under the pseudonym S. G. Tallentyre wrote in her book *The Friends of Voltaire* :"I disapprove of what you say, but I will defend to the death your right to say it". This is often cited to describe the principle of Freedom of Speech.

Compare this to the exchange in that super film *Inherit The Wind* (a fictionalised version of the 1920's 'monkey trial' in which a young teacher is prosecuted for teaching Darwin's Theory of Evolution) between Henry Drummond, the defending advocate (played by Spencer Tracy) and E. K. Hornbeck, a hardbitten cynical reporter (played by Gene Kelly). Near the end of the film, when the trial is over, Henry says to E. K.: "You poor slob! You're all alone. When you go to your grave, there won't be anybody to pull the grass up over your head. Nobody to mourn you. Nobody to give a damn. You're all alone." And Hornbeck's reply: "You're wrong, Henry. You'll be there. You're the type. Who else would defend my right to be lonely?"

In one of the so-called quality rags a person wrote to the advice column bemoaning that, wishing to furnish her second home in Spain, she could not locate a decent furniture store in or around Malaga. Isn't it reassuring to know that amid pestilence, disease, famine, poverty and a pandemic raging throughout the world, some vacuous airhead has her priorities in the right order?

A chum asked me whence the expression and explanation of 'knocking on wood' or, more often, 'touch wood'. As usual, the answer is never that simple. I had heard that yew trees were found mostly in churchyards because they had religious significance and were poisonous and that generally churchyards were surrounded by fences or walls in order to protect humans and straying animals from harm. Not entirely true as you can find yews anywhere, particularly in ancient times as they were the favoured wood for making English longbows. Be that as it may, the favoured reason for touching wood is that in Celtic folklore supernatural beings are thought to live in trees, and can be invoked for protection. Pagans believed that trees were the homes of fairies and other mystical creatures and that, in these instances, people might knock on or touch wood to request good luck, or to distract spirits with evil intentions. Or you just might awaken and release the good wood fairies dwelling there. Not terrifically exciting, what? If wood is not around and you touch your napper instead this is merely a jokey response.

Another piece of cracking news is that the registration of newborns has been delayed due to the coronavirus lockdown and that, as a consequence (wait for it), thousands of families are being denied a holiday abroad because, without being registered, *newborns cannot be given a birth certificate which is needed for a passport.* A certain person is quoted as saying: "We have no chance of a family holiday until this is sorted. Our friends are making plans and we are left behind". Heaven forbid, the deprivations some folk have to endure.


Police Constable Harper, four weeks after his wedding, attempting to intercede in the theft of a quad bike was dragged a mile to his death by the getaway car. The three men convicted of the crime laughed and joked throughout the trial and when the verdict of manslaughter was announced the public gallery, crammed with their supporters, cheered. This act and their behaviour was unforgivable. The three young men happen to be from the traveller community. Is that fact relevant and is the mentioning of it merely reinforcing the bigotry and prejudice of the non-travelling community and the centuries old persecution of a group of people because they lead a lifestyle that is alien to gorgios (non-gypsies - in itself a misnomer) that many folk do not, and will not, attempt to understand. I do not pretend to know the answer but those of you who have followed these scribbles may remember that I have oft times written about my (and Mrs Abe's) dealings with the travellers and have found them to be more sinned against than sinning. They have added to my understanding of the human race, to be fair not always in a positive way but generally so, and when the occasion demands I shall continue to bang the drum on their behalf.

I don't care for the indiscriminate spreading around of birthday honours. It seems that you will eventually find them given in cornflake packets. However, if lesser mortals such as Stokes, Murray, Farah, Botham, etc. are being awarded gongs, what on earth does Lewis Hamilton have to do to earn a knighthood? An easy target for some folks (tax exile, over-gobby about racism, taking few prisoners in his comments) let us remember that he is the greatest F1 Champion this country has ever had, or is ever likely to have, and a great ambassador for the sport. It's surely long overdue time for Sir Lewis to arise.

Isn't it super to see the wee Angel up and running again, albeit in a slightly different format? No standing around talking drivel to your oppos, which I miss. Nonetheless I have not heard anyone say anything but good about the pub.

The Red House in Aldeburgh, home of Benjamin Britten (from 1957-76) and Peter Pears (57-86) is open once again for visits by the public. Do have a look, even if Britten's music does not interest you. Lots to see, including a fine art collection, and bear in mind that Britten was a good old Suffolk boy, born in Lowestoft, appropriately on St Cecilia's day, Patron Saint of Music, 22nd November 1913. An interesting local village connection is that some years ago, Jeff, from Church Close delivered BB's newspaper to the Red House and, as a gratuity each Christmas, BB would present Jeff with a ten bob note. (I reckon the youngsters might be a mite baffled by the mention of the. ten bob note). It's just no fun any more.
